All are agreed that certain prices must be paid after a certain date, which in effect means, "If you haven't got the money, you needn't send around" (for

low. Mr. Editor, i believe I am olding the semiments of no small portion of the public when I say that the present rates are high enough for eny city of our size to be paying.

I notice that in extenuation of their action it is claimed that the rates here are not as high as in Nova Scoitor, I want to emphatically contradict both these statements. In Nova Scotia's capital-Halifax-the rates charged in average cases are some places not as high. In Sydney, the terminal of Nova Scotia, the fees are not as high as those charged in

certain cases. As far as our earning power is concerned, we cannot even compare favorably, if calculations are made on average basis, which is the only correct method of ascertaining. The average mechanic in Nova Scotia comanands \$3.00 per day, more or less, oftentimes more than less; while in the eastern provinces-the mining strong holds of Nova Scotia--workmen draw from \$3 to \$5 per day for ordinary surface work, and for skilled labor the regular wage is \$5 to \$6 per day Added to that, they are afforded work the whole year round, while it is quite a new thing for our workmen to have more than eight months' work in any year. Judging by the number of motor cycles, automobiles and fast pacers owned by the city medicoes, it is safe to assume that they are not ! the worst off, and there is room for a lot of comment on this phase of the question, when we remember that the oldtime doctors - doctors in every sense of the word-were content to walk around to their patents, or in a few cases, enjoy the luxury of a horse and carriage.
