



## At the City Hall

Mayor Ellis presided at yesterday's meeting of the Council, and the full Board was in attendance.

Principal King, of the Centenary Hall School, called the Council's attention to a defective drain on Gilbert Street, which matter will be attended to.

James Newhook, 157 Pleasant St., asked permission to build an annex to his house. Referred to the Engineer.

F. W. Ayre, Circular Road, complained of irregular removal of ashes which will be investigated.

The Engineer submitted an extensive report of the city water mains and sewer pipes. It was decided to ask the Government for a loan of \$70,000 to replace the necessary pipes.

Councillor Mullaly's motion for reconsideration of the vote for increase of salaries, caused a lengthy discussion. The motion was lost, by a counter motion by Councillor Mullaly that the Secretary be disallowed perquisites was carried. Councillor Mullaly then pointed out that there was nothing in the minutes to show that the regular perquisites of the Secretary were included in the increased salary.

While Councillor Mullaly was speaking to the deferred motion relating to theatrical taxes, Councillor Ryan and Martin left the chamber which Councillor Mullaly resented and after a scathing criticism of the Board left the Hall. He is sending a formal resignation to-day.

The meeting adjourned at 6.30 p.m.

## Placentia Mail Service.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir—I noticed an article signed "Wide Awake" in the Daily News of the 9th inst. in which the writer very justly condemned the present inadequate mail service performed in Placentia Bay, and strongly advocated a semi-weekly one. I feel sure the thousands of people in that portion of the bay to which he referred, fully endorse the sentiments expressed, and are appreciative of the writer's effort in agitating for reform in this matter, which if effected, would surely be a great impetus to our social and commercial advancement. Undoubtedly it would be the greatest boon that could be granted to that portion of the bay included in "Washers, Red Island route."

But how can we expect anything so complete with conveniences and advantages to us, so far abreast of the times and in keeping with the ideas of twentieth century civilization, when existing conditions are tolerated? An eight-day service did you say, Mr. "Wide Awake"? I rubbed the sleep from my eyes this morning and awoke to the fact that the steamer went over the bay route twenty-three days ago, but not since. Passengers, freight and mails are "hung up" at Placentia all this time and apparently not an effort is being made to remedy the awful situation.

The S.S. Clyde—last going duty on the bay, was forced to steam for life from the pier in the Roadstead, during the storm which raged some time ago, and is now frozen in inside the "Gut" ever since. Of course we passengers, although greatly irritated, are not so unreasonable as to expect she should remain at the wharf that storm, exposed as it is to the full fury of the ocean, when the heights there awaiting shipment swept away and the pier itself could be compared to nothing but a breakwater. But why, I ask, instead of going inside the "Gut" to be frozen in, did they not run the Clyde to Argentia, each an ideal harbor nearby—safe, spacious and so situated that every wind that blows, shifts the ice, hence rendering it impossible to be frozen efficiently to prevent a steamer going in or out at any time.

It appears that the motive must be to deprive the bay of steam communication for the remainder of the winter. If not what excuse is to be offered for "discontinuing the service" and leaving many boats lying up at St. John's, why not send up another? It is apparent that the people of Placentia Bay are considered of such little importance that the ship-shod "truckley-muck" service at present existing can be unreservedly thrust upon them.

If the Argyle people could live up to the schedule, that indeed would be poor enough, but when we consider that she hasn't been on time for months past and that passengers are at Placentia almost a month waiting to get to Hr. Buffett and other places in the bay route, we are forced to conclude that the time is being played to suit the Reids, while the people must pay the piper. It looks too, as if the Government motto is "hustle up and give Placentia with its loafers and pensioners a silly mail." The Ancient Capital is rocked upon by some hon member of the district. I wish it was down Sound Island for a month or two now, or if we had to vote for Mr. Baker last fall, I presume we would come within their range of vision and the Government would be doling their hats to us and offering with courtesy to our needs.

There is no ice in Placentia Bay now except the bit that holds the Clyde inside the "Barriway." Why then, not make a move and give passenger chance to get to their homes and families.

Trusting you will be pleased to give space to this humble epistle which is written in the interest of the shermen of Placentia Bay.
