Peace.

The signing by Germany of the Treaty of Peace at Versailles brings to an end the War of Arms begun by the Germans on the fields of Belgium. So long as Germany and the Allies abide by the terms of this momentous document, the thunder of the guns and the tramp of armed peoples will never be heard. The wheels of industry will turn with their one-time speed; rail and road will be alive with their accustomed traffic; and the fleets of the world will come and go, once more, on all the seven seas. And although the returning warrior will not, in the fashion of his forbears, hang up his shield and spear, or his flintlock above the hearth, he will carry, deeply graven upon the tablets of his memory, sights and sounds of this ferocious world war, that will confront him as long as memory endures.

But the material peace which has come by the stroke of the pen at Versailles is, after all, but an outward and visible sign of a peace, unseen, unwritten, but eagerly hoped for, without which the Versailles document may prove to be but one more scrap of paper. If the vanquished nations who, by their accredited representatives, set their hand and seal to the covenant of peace, did so with a hatred, blind, unreasoning and implacable in their

hearts, it will be merely a question of time and opportunity before the armed multitudes will be on the march and red ruin will stride again across the world.

It is our firm belief that there is no evidence to the contrary—that the nations of the Entente, in this the supreme hour of accomplishment, are more concerned with the healing of the world than with the humiliation of the enemy. In reviewing the long-drawn-out horrors of the war and the interminable anxieties of the Peace Conference, the dispassionate historian of the future will write it down that the nations of the Entente were animated and sustained by two absorbing motives—or ambitions, if you will—first, to save Civilization, and then to make it secure. Civilization was saved by the unconquerable courage and endurance of the Entente armies during four and a half years of the bloodiest fighting the world has ever known; it was made secure, for the time being, when the labors of the Peace Conference were sealed by the approval of the men who have set Civilization at defiance. We say "for the time being"; for the enduring quality of the peace thus secured is a matter for Germany to decide. If we shall have to deal with a disillusioned but unrepentant Germany, the peace of the world, so far as she is concerned, is a sacrilegious sham—a machiavellian mockery.

We repeat that the question of ultimate peace or war is one for Ger-

many to decide; for in voluntarily banding themselves together in a League of Nations the Entente has gone on record as unalterably opposed to war. Through the League it hopes to substitute reason for force, confidence for distrust, fair dealing for trickery, and an enlightened sense of common interests for the old international aloofness.

The Peace Treaty, with its heavy penalties and restrictions, is merely a vindication of that international morality, which our one-time enemy so ruthlessly set at defiance. It no more breathes the spirit of persecution than does the judge who pronounces sentence in a criminal court. Clear proof of this is seen in the provision that, if Germany shows evidence of sincerity in carrying out the terms of the treaty, she will be admitted to membership in the League. In respect of sincerity, alas, she has made a very poor start. For in her notification of acceptance, she arrogantly stated she was signing, under compulsion, a treaty whose terms she never expected to fulfill; and in the same hour she placed the crowning mark of dishonor upon her unparalleled record by breaking her parole and sinking her interned fleet.

It is stretching charity to the limit to express the hope that these things have been done blindly in the anguish of an extreme hour of humiliation. Let us hope that sober second thought will teach the Germans that the winning back of the confidence of the

world does not lie that way.—Scientific American.

Billiards on Horseback.

There have, from time to time, been many freak billiard matches, in which the competitors have seriously handicapped themselves and their scoring abilities by playing with broom-handles, umbrellas, etc., instead of the usual cue.

But the limit of eccentricity was surely reached some thirty years ago, when two wealthy Americans named Warrington and Lewis decided to contest a game of a hundred up on horseback for £1,000 a side.

No Records in Danger.

A hall in New York was chosen as the venue and a billiard-table was erected on a big platform.

At the appointed time the contestants rode up to the table on magnificent steeds and the fun began. They held the reins and guided their horses with their left hands, while with the right they manipulated the cue with such dexterity as the novel conditions rendered possible.

As may be imagined, the breaks never threatened to beat record, and the game lasted for two hours. Mr. Warrington was the first to reach his points with a break of twelve, scoring three cannons in succession and pocketing the red twice. The margin of points in his favor was thirty.

When You Stay With the King.

The King and Queen, like the rest of us, are making up for lost time. Not that either of them have lost a minute during the war, but since entertaining during war time has of course been out of the question, they are now making up to their friends in this respect.

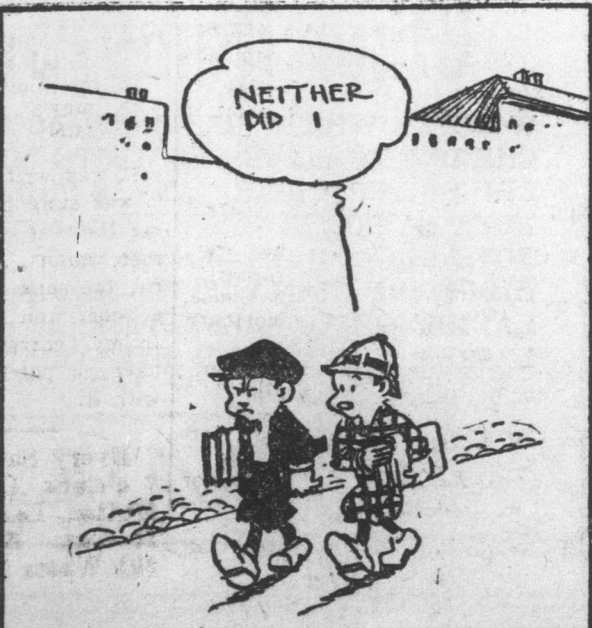
