With all the unbounded power which he had assumed over the public revenues, instead of endeavoring to find a series of gradual, progressive, honorable and adequate rewards for the persons who served the public in subordinate situations, he left them to prey upon the people without the smallest degree of control. In default of honest emoluments, there was the unbounded license of power to help themselves; and, (as one of the honestest and ablest ex-servants of the colony once said to me in conversation about public affairs) "Our civil service resembled the the military service of Mexico-little pay, but unbounded license to plund-

The circumstances in the system to which I refer, in a great measure, vitiated and perverted what is in reality-and many things are in reality-excellent in it. The laws which we have made, the covenants which the Government has obliged its servants to enter into, the occasional orders that have been given at least ostensibly good, all have proved noxious to the country, instead of beneficial. The consequence is this-he who has taken but one dollar of unlawful emolument-does not dare to complain of the most abandoned extortion and covetousness in any of his fellow officials. He who has taken a trifle perhaps as the reward of "a little overtime" is obliged to be silent when he sees the deplorable condition around him. This was the chief source of the late Premier's shortlived power!

His Government, throughout its strange and eventful career, was most unpopular. No one defended it whose defence was worth anything. The two houses, with their overpaid members, were allowed to do their work as ill as possible, and to be expensive in-
