Just asking: "Can't I ever get at this mirror without your wanting to come here?"

Just saying: "Pass me that book, will you," and then when the wrong one is handed over saying sharply: "No, not that one, the other one. If

there's a wrong thing to do, you'll do it won't you?"

Just making the family criticisms that may perhaps be needed in a sharp, irritable way that makes them hurt unnecessarily. "If you knew how you looked with your hat on that way you'd want to jump overboard." "If you could see the way Mrs. S. smiled behind your back when you were telling that old story the other day you would try and not make yourself ridiculous by telling stories over and over again." You know the sort of dig that is so often given in the name helpfulness but in the spirit of hurtfulness.

Makes The Sun Stop Shining.

Just saying and doing sharply, impatiently, irritably, all sorts of little things that if said and done pleasantly would produce just so much result and wouldn't make the sun stop shining in the home.

We all know husbands and wives who love each other devotedly and sons and daughters who love their fathers and mothers devotedly, and who do anything in the world for those they love so much. That is, anything but this little thing, just being pleasant.

To some of these the day will come when they will look back and realize what they have withheld. God help them then. They will need it.

Unless perchance something opens their eyes and they help themselves here and now while they can.

DORCAS SOCIETY REPORT, 1923-24.

In presenting the hundredth report of the Dorcas Society we feel we must say a little more than usual.

The Society was formed October 29th, 1924; its first President being Mrs. Ward, wife of the Rev. D. S. Ward, Congregational Minister here at that time. The next Presidents were: Mrs. R. Job, Mrs. Smith and Mrs. David Slater.

The main object of the Society was to make warm clothing for the poor women and disburse coal and groceries; and for one hundred years it has gone on in the same way.

Unfortunately the books were burned in the great fire of 1892. We all know what great assistance the Society gave at that time. Lady Thorburn was then President and continued so until her death in 1906.

Since then Mrs. Pitts took charge and we are glad to say is still holding the reins. During this long period death has made many changes in the Committee; but it will be seen that all those who are now associated with the Society will keep up the high standard that has been attained by their predecessors.

We trust that our hundredth appeal to the public will receive an even more generous response than usual.

At our last meeting Mrs. Robert McNett and Mrs. Hepburn long associated with the Society were made Honorary Members, and their places filled by Mrs. Wilfred Dove and Mrs. Ralph Wood.

The Accounts of the Society are Audited annually by Mr. W. B. Fraser to whom our most grateful thanks are due; also the Government for their annual grant.

The Society is under the most distinguished patronage of His Excellency the Governor and Lady Allardice.

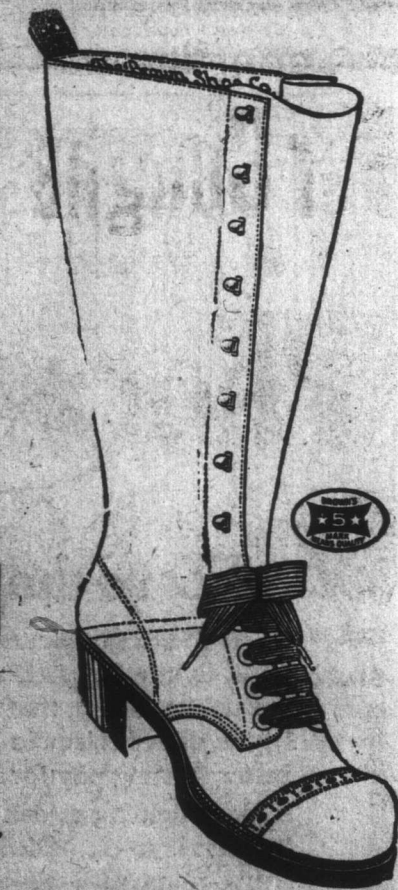
