HOME AGAIN.—Messrs. J. and A. Pratt, for the last twelve months on a visit to their friends in England, returned to Guelph last Wednesday.

THANKSGIVING DAY.—The Moderator of the Synod of the Canada Presbyterian Church has recommended the observance of Thursday, 21st, as a day of thanksgiving for the favourable harvest.

SENATE CHAMBER, Ottawa, Nov. 7th.

The Roman Difficulty! RIOTS IN ITALY!

MILITARY ACTIVITY IN TURKEY! BREAD RIOTS IN ENGLAND.

To-day's Despatches. Paris, Nov. 6.—The Emperor of Austria left Paris yesterday for Vienna.

Paris, Nov. 7.—In the recent engagements near Monte Rotondo, the Papal troops were badly beaten until the arrival of the French troops, when the tide of battle turned.

Paris, Nov. 7.—There have been serious riots, incited by the party of action, in different parts of Italy, particularly at Milan, where it was found necessary to call out the troops to quell the disturbances.

London, Nov. 7th, noon.—The disturbances caused by want of employment and scarcity of food continues in Devonshire. Riots are reported at Torquay, Exeter, and other places in the country.

The London Times of this morning has an editorial on the Alabama claims, commenting with much severity on the last despatch on the subject addressed by Secretary Seward to Mr. Adams.

London, Nov. 7th.—The Italians assert that nine thousand French soldiers under command of Gen. Polhes, belonging to the Division which first reached Rome, came to the assistance of the Papal forces during their last engagement with the insurgents.

Paris, Nov. 7.—The Monteur of today has ceased and that no more troops will leave that port for Italy.

London, Nov. 7.—The Times of today predicts that, should Napoleon fall in bringing about a general Conference of the European powers to settle the Roman question, he will abandon the defence of the temporal power of the Pope, and leave Italy free to decide upon the future position of Rome.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 7.—It is reported here on good authority that the Sultan of Turkey is making unusual military preparations. In support of the report, it is stated that 50,000 needle guns have recently been purchased by the Turkish government.

Berlin, Nov. 7th.—All the towns in Schleswig-Holstein have joined the Zollverein, with the exception of Altona. The election of Deputies to the next Prussian Diet took place today.

Paris, Nov. 7.—The financial statement published on the Bourse reports that the metallic reserve of the Bank of France has increased 100,000 during the past week.

Florence, Nov. 7.—Accounts of the last engagement near Rome have been received. During the battle on Sunday, Garibaldi brought into action 10,000 men.

At one time during the engagement the Papal troops were beaten and Garibaldi was gaining ground, when the French came up and turned his victory into a defeat.

Paris, Nov. 7th, evening.—Information has been received from Rome that the Pontifical authorities intend to prosecute those citizens who voted in favor of the union with Italy.

Manchester, Nov. 7.—At the sitting of the special commission to-day the count of the Crown abandoned the count of the remaining indictments, and all the prisoners now untried will be proceeded against on the charge of sedition.

A Government Currency. The Free Press, speaking of the rise in value of Canadian Bank notes, says:—"The fact that the notes of the Commercial Bank are already held at 91c and 92c in Montreal, indicates to what a great extent confidence has been restored in the soundness of the currency of that unfortunately managed institution.

The banks, looking to themselves first and the public afterwards, are reported as keeping "tight"—which means that the public are suffering from a deficiency of bank accommodation.

The King of Prussia is said to have had a narrow escape of his life in a Wurtemberg railway. The train in which his Majesty was travelling was upset through running into a cart drawn by an oxen near Gippingen, which was crossing the line.

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
