## CAMPBELL IS SURE TO MAKE GOOD IN THE RING

Referee of Match Which Hyland Lost, Prophesies a Great Career for Him

Referee a Friend of Hylands for Years and Helped Him Plan Boxing Career

Had to Give Verdict Against Well Known Boxer—Tells About His Difficulties

The following story of the Campbell-Hyland bout written by Biddy Bishop is especially interesting because of the man who wrote it and the man who was most concerned in the bout—Dick Hyland.

Biddy Bishop is one of the best journalistic authorities at the coast. For a number of years he followed the game very closely in the Pacific Northwest. Five years ago Biddy took the position of sporting editor of the Tacoma News but he has returned practically all the big contests on the northwest coast during that time. His giving of the decision against Hyland in the recent bout speaks words for his fairness. Biddy and Dick have for years been personal friends and through Biddy Bishop that Hyland decided to come to Calgary. The following story gives an insight to the personal side of refereeing a boxing contest.

The victory of Ray Campbell over "Fighting Dick" Hyland, Saturday at Steveston, near Vancouver, B.C., opens the way for this young Seattle boxer to make a name for himself within the limits of the world's boxing ring. Hyland is worth something to any lad who has his career ahead of him. True, Hyland is not the great whirlwind boxer he was when he was meeting men like Battling Nelson, Packey McFarland, Leach Cross and other former-champions. Campbell was given the decision in the sixth round by the writer. The Seattle boy was clearly entitled to the verdict.

Campbell is a former business partner in eight of the 15 rounds. He held Hyland even in four other rounds, while Hyland was the great whirlwind for a time. Campbell used straight lefts for the face and he followed these with hard straight right crosses to the face. At times these blows fairly staggered Dick but he came back gamely each time and tried his best to fight back. Campbell was always too fast for him. Campbell also used his left hand to the body and he even hit the nerve at times to box in close with Hyland, at which Hyland is supposed to excel. Campbell was very cool and deliberate throughout.

It was one of the most remarkable experiences of my life to give a decision against Dick Hyland. I had known Dick ever since he was a kid about seven or eight years ago. I had coached him and a younger and wiser man, McClinton took the management of Hyland I guess I did about two-thirds of the work in getting the boy started. It did this because I liked him, because he was a clean, honest lad, who was trying to earn enough money to buy his mother a good home.

Disagreeable Features. "Later when Dick was at and boxed some of the best men in the game I watched his career closely and in correspondence with him for a long time. Less than 10 months ago he wrote me from Los Angeles and asked me to get him a match up this way. I sent word to Tommy Burns at Calgary and soon afterward Dick came north in his six Pal Brown. He stopped over at Tacoma on his way to Calgary and visited with me. I am not sure I know to bring out the disagreeable features of refereeing boxing matches, giving a decision against a fellow whom you would under any other conditions be pulling hard for to win.

Jack Kearns, who trained and managed Hyland for the contest with Campbell, was a former business partner of mine. I had conducted a weekly newspaper with him at Spokane just before I came to Tacoma about seven years ago. Jack and I have always been very friendly. What did me good was the fact that Kearns acknowledged to me that Hyland had been beaten fairly and he could not have made any other decision.

Not a Snap. Judging boxing matches is not the nicest or easiest job in the world. It makes little difference how you handle a match, but your decision will either put you off, whether it is right or whether you err, you have two-thirds the work of it to start with. It is especially hard when you are judging a contest in which you are the least bit friendly with one of the contestants.
