The boys' temperance night school was

Youth Convicted for Assault.

It is generally known that a bad lot of
boys loiter around the vicinity of Clark's
Bridge at night. According to evidence
deduced in the Police Court this morning,
Joseph Stanley, who works for Dr. Moore,
was proceeding from church last Sunday
evening when he was accosted by a young
man, who was a domestic employee in a
house, and when half a mile south of the bridge, on the road to
the latter's home, were accosted by some
other boys. He managed to escape after
some chasing from the whole party of
seven and found P. C. Chalmers, who
returned with him to the spot
from whence the boys had flown.

As a result, Stanley swore an indictment
out against Corbin for assault. The girl
corroborated the plaintiff's evidence and
said Corbin had afterwards walked home
with her, and held her by the hand. Mr. Frank
Spittigue testified to the character of the
defendant, who had been in his employ a
month, but the prosecuting attorney, Mr.
McKillop, met this statement by announcing
that the boy had been before the Police
Court a dozen times and had been con-
victed within a little more than a month
ago. Mr. Frank Love defended the pris-
oner as well as possible with the material
at his hands. The Magistrate sentenced
Corbin to one month's hard labor. His ad-
ditional warning had evidently no effect on
the youthful criminal, who, as he was leav-
ing the room, shook his fist at Stanley, and
with an oath said he would get even with
him. For this he was brought back into
court. The Magistrate declined to increase
the punishment, although commenting on
his own leniency.

tions, from the drawer superintended
over by Dr. F. E. Clark, president of
the union societies of the United States,
together with their masterly answers, were
also reproduced with great profit to the

secretary of the Y. M. C. A., followed with
an earnest plea for the co-operation of the
Endeavor Societies with the Y. M. C. A.
He pointed out several existing evils which
might be remedied by the united action of
the two bodies, and suggested the habit of
cigarette smoking which was prevalent
among the small boys of the city. In con-
cluding the speaker invited the young men
of the Endeavor Societies to make the Y.
M. C. A. rooms their headquarters and
promised them a hearty welcome. The
meeting closed after an address by Rev. T.
E. Harrison on "Christian Endeavor
Work," in the course of which the speaker
urged his hearers to accept Christ as their
first motive power. After that was done
the entire machinery of the society should
be put in motion and the work would be
sure to succeed. Rev. W. J. Clark, pastor
of the First Presbyterian Church, was to
have delivered the address entitled
"Our Endeavor," which created so favor-
able an impression at the Hamilton conven-
tion, but he was prevented owing to a
severe cold. The local union now includes
nine societies, and as four new societies
