A GREAT FIRE. Paris, Aug. 10 .- The buildings in which an exhibition was being held at Montpelier, Department of Herault, France, were destroyed by fire yesterday. Among the exhibits burned were a number of historical documents and valuable works of art. The loss is estimated at 3,000,000 francs

TROOPS FOR CUBA. Madrid, Aug. 19 .- The first embarkment of fourteen thousand troops for Cuba will commence at Santander on Aug. 23, terminating on Aug. 26. The second will take place from Aug. 30 till Sept. 6, after which date the cavalry will embark. By Sept. 11 the expedition of forty thousand

men will have left the peninsula. INTENSE HEAT IN RUSSIA. London, Aug. 19.-Abnormal heat, similar to that which prevailed in America, is prevailing throughout the south of Russia. The heat is so intense that all outdoor work is frequently suspended. During the three weeks which have been marked by the high temperature the mortality has increased from 27,000 to 45,000, as compared with the preceding three

TO SEEK OTHER CUSTOM. London, Aug. 19 .- The Berlin correspondent of the Chronicle says that looking to the possibility of a protection regime in the United States under McKinley, and the reducing of German-American trade, the directors of the North German Lloyd Steamship Company meditate new lines in other directions, especially in Eastern Asia, for the employment of their fleet. He says that they will ask the Government to increase the subsidy for steamship lines of this character.

HEALY VS. DILLON. London, Aug. 19. - At a meetlazy man's assistant had to go. All Timothy Healy, held in Dublin last night, a resolution was adopted denouncing the coming Nationalist convention as a mere attempt of Mr. John Dillon to bolster up his own leadership, and to promote his personal ambition. Another resolution was adopted, expressing satisfaction that the Irish Land Bill had been passed by Parliament. Mr. Healy declared that so long as Mr. Dillon was at the head of the Nationalists the party would never achieve success. Mr. Murphy, chairman, denounced the convention as a delusion and a snare

for Irishmen in foreign countries. DEVANEY SURPRISED. Glasgow, Aug. 19.-Thos. Devaney, the Irish dynamiter, who was somtenced in Edinburgh in 1883 to serve a term of life imprisonment, and was released from Portland Prison yesterday, has arrived here. Devaney says that John Daly will be set at liberty next week. He had no knowledge of any of the important events which had occurred outside the prison walls during his incarceration, and expressed great surprise at hearing that Parnell was dead. Devaney said to friends whom he talked with that his prison life was an experience too awful to admit of descrip tion. During the whole time of his imprisonment he said he never once had the slightest chance to escape.

The correspondent of the Berlin Lokal Anzeiger, who has returned to Hammerfest from Spitzbergen, telegraphs that he met Sir Wm. Martin Conway, who said he had on Aug. 1 seen Andre, the Swedish explorer, who set out to discover the North Pole by means of a balloon. M. Andre thought it was then too late to start on his balloon voyage, and that he would probably return home and go back in April to Spitzbergen, from which place the balloon voyage was to commence. Sir Wm. Conway added that there was a strong wind the day after he saw M. Andre, and as that was the wind the explorer had been waiting for, he had, perhaps, started on his voyage.

THE SOUDAN SITUATION. London, Aug. 19.-The latest arrivals at Cairo from Omdurman, via Berber, state that the Khalifa is in a state of great fear. He frequently dispatches proclamations to all parts of the Soudan, calling the people to be prepared for the expected great Jehad with the infidels, and to send to Omdurman all the available men from Kordofan and Darfur. Men are coming into the Khalifa's camp daily, M.P. and though not numerous, they are divided between Omdurman and Dongola. The man who carried the news of the defeat at Ferkeh was immediately put in heavy chains and sent to prison, with strict orders not to let communicate with anyone, and all his property has been forfeited. Taxes from the natives are being rigorously collected—the kurbash and other kinds of torture being applied for the purpose. THE BOERS. London, Aug. 19 .- The correspondent

of the Times at Pretoria notes the continued arming of the forces of the Transvaal Republic, and dwells upon the universal opinion existing among the Boers that an attempt to overthrow the treaty obligations towards England is meditated. The correspondent is of the opinion that the more shrewd view is that the Transvaal authorities will only "try on" the pro-gramme intended for the purpose of seeing how much England will "stand," and if signs of weakness are detected they will make the abrogation of the treaty clauses adopted by the Anglo-Boer convention of 1884, which placed the English Government in control of the foreign relations of the Transvaal Republic, the base of a compromise. In conclusion, the correspondent asserts that he is confident that the Transvaal Government will not go to the extent of fighting. He believes that President Kruger is too wary to allow the Boers to be forced into a course which could only lead to disaster.

YACHTING DISASTER.

Emperor William's Yacht Meteor Ran Into the Isolde-Her Owner Killed.

Southsea, Aug. 19.—The Ailsa, Britannia, Satanita and Meteor started yesterday in a race for the commodore's cup and £25. Not long after the start the Meteor collided with Baron Von Zedwitz's American yacht Isolde. The latter was dismasted several of her crew were knocked overboard, and Baron Von Zedwitz was so seriously injured by falling rigging that he died while being taken to the hospital. He was a German privy councilor and a member of both the Reichstag and the Prussian Diet, and had been in Parliament for about 25 years, was a leading authority on finance in politics and was leader of the Free Conservative

party. Particulars of the disaster show that in passing the committee boat the big yachts overtook the 20-raters. The Britannia and Meteor were then almost abreast of the Isolde, and narrowly escaped a collision. The Britannia suddenly shifted her helm to The Saint, when the Meteor avoid struck the Isolde, sweeping her from stem to stern with her bow-sprit. Satisfactory Settlement of the Manitoba Question in Sight.

Conciliatory Negotiations Make a Favorable Result,

Interference by the Ottawa Government

Rendered Unnecessary. Ottawa, Aug. 19.-Messrs. Sifton, Cameron and Watson, of the Manitoba Government were in the city today and had interviews with Mr. Isolde's mainmast and sails crashed Laurier, Mr. Tarte and some of the other Ministers. Everything now points to a speedy and satisfactory settlement of the school question, and there will not be any necessity for remedial legislation. This gratifying result is entirely due to the conciliatory policy pursued by Mr. Laurier and his colleagues, which has had such a splendid effect in educating public opinion upon the whole subject. It is understood that negotiations have been going on between the members of the Manitoba Government and the Dominion Cabinet for some days past, and that an amicable understanding has been reached between the parties concerned. These negotiations have been carried on in decided contrast to the way in which both the Bowell and the Tupper Governments handled the whole question, and when the result will be made known it will prove to be

satisfactory to all fair-minded classes of the community. The matter has been approached by both the Federal and Local Governments in a friendly spirit, with a desire to do justice to all parties, and before long the whole matter will be removed from the political arena in a statesmanlike way. This, too, has This, too, has been accomplished at the very moment when Archbishop Langevin is at Rome trying to induce his Holiness the Pope to denounce Mr. Laurier and the Liberal party for the conciliatory policy they pursued, while at the same time the leaders of the Conservative party are trying in the province of Ontario to stir up race and religious prejudices against the Liberal Government.
