MOSTLY FAIR AND COOLER.

Toronto, Sept. 14-11 p.m.—The decrease in pressure which took place over Lakes Superior and Michigan yesterday has caused the development of a low area, which passed quickly eastward, and is now central over the Lower St. Lawrence, and has given local showers in Ontario, and is now causing them in Eastern Quebec. High pressure continues over the Northwest, with fair weather, which is spreading eastward to the lakes. Minimum and maximum temperatures:

Steel Watches and Other Valuables Cut of the Hotels.

The thefts in both places were committed in broad daylight, but one was not discovered for some time. In one of the hotels a servant went to her room shortly after dinner, but found the door locked. Thinking her room-mate had turned the lock, the girl went downstairs to get the key, but finding that such was not the case, she returned to the room. The door was then wide open, and a glance showed that a thief had made a call. A watch and chain were missing, and no trace of them or the thief has since been found. The city detectives are working on the case, and warn citizens to be on their guard against all kinds of sharpers.

They were literally covered with dust.

Arrangements have been made for this battalion to leave at 9:30 Saturday morning for home.

THE 21ST ESSEX FUSILIERS.

This battalion was organized in May, 1885 by Lieut.-Col. Wilkinson, of Leamington. He had been connected with the Leamington companies since 1862. In the spring of 1885 he started out through the country to look for officers for this battalion. His great endeavor was to get men of experience, and nearly every officer he had was a man who had either been through the school or had seen active service in 1865 and 1866. The staff under Lieut.-Col. Wilkinson were: Major Gillett, Windsor; Capt. Reeve, Quarter-Master; Capt. McLoche, Paymaster; Surgeon H. R. Casgrain, and Adjutant, Capt. Charles C. Fox. There were five companies under the following heads: No. 1, Capt. Cheyne; No. 2, Capt. Lee; No. 3, Capt. Jones; No. 4, Capt. Templeton; No. 5, Capt. Dawson.

There have been many changes since that time, and the officers are getting in better shape all the while. Nearly every officer of the new battalion has likely been through the school or is attending.

As soon as we came to camp we settled down to work as though we had been here for ten days," said Pay-Master Captain McLoche. There are in this battalion today quite a number of officers who served in 1866. Speaking of the Americans in his battalion Major Gillett said: "The statement that there are Americans in this battalion is as false as it is foolish. It would be a gross breach of military regulations to swear in a man who was not a Canadian. We have many men who have places of business in the United States and who live in Canada, and who go across the river every morning. They are Canadians, though, and cannot be termed Americans simply because they do business across the line any more than an Irish merchant doing business in Canton could be called a Chinaman. Capt. Cheyne has two men in his company who came all the way from the other end of Michigan to join the battalion in camp, and
