The game is much the same as hockey. Off side plays are allowed, and instead of a flat, circular puck, a vulcanized rubber ball is used. The sticks are slightly shorter than those used in hockey, and behind each goal a wire cage is placed, in the front of which netting is hung. This prevents all dis-putes as to whether or not a goal is secured.
