SWINDLING THE KAISER.

Berlin, April 16.-The Kaiser has unearthed a big conspiracy, extending over several years, in the army. Many infantry, cavalry and artillery regiments are concerned, it being declared that subalterns in these various branches of the service have been systematically manufacturing excepas records of long distance rides, in order to obtain the much-covered prizes. The Kaiser's suspicions were aroused by being so often asked for rewards by the same persons successively ,and he ordered an investigation the result of which has created a sen sation, not only in army circles, but generally.

SPANISH ELECTION FIGURES. A Factory Blown Up—Two Persons Killed and Others Probably Dying.

Chicago, April 16.-One of the main buildings of the Chicago Fireworks Company, at Grosse Point, fourteen miles north of this city, blew up yesterday morning, resulting in the death of two employes and the serious and probably fatal injury of six more. The dead are: Nicholas Boree and Annie Boree, his sister.

The first discharge blew out the sides of the building, letting the roof fall n. A moment later there was another explosion, which shattered the roof. As yet the remains of Annie Borce have not been found, and it is the belief that she was blown to pieces. Nicholas Boree, her brother, was norribly mangled. Several others were so badly burned and lacerated that it is feared they will die. There were eight persons at work in the building at the time, not one of whom escaped injury.

Y., April 16.-Among the pills passed by the Assembly without debate or dissent, and put on the calendar of the Senate, is one practically doing away with common law marriages in this State. It provides that "neither party to a marriage hereafter contracted in this State, without solemnization by a minister, magistrate or some person authorized by statute, shall be entitled to rights of property, succession, or administration by virtue of such marriage, nor alimony or counsel fees in proceedings involving such marriage, unless some note or memorandum of such marriage be in writing and subscribed by the party to such marriage, or whose estate is sought to be changed or affected thereby. Nothing herein contained shall affect any marriage entered into between members of the sect known as Quakers, nor the legitimacy of children, nor the application of the law as to bigamy.'
