AN INQUEST WAS ORDERED

Into the Circumstances Surrounding the Death of Peter Peterson.

Late Saturday afternoon, Dr. Ferguson, coroner, South London, received instructions from County Crown Attorney Magee to hold an inquest into the death of the late Peter Peterson, employed at the Canadian Packing Company's factory. The inquest was opened in the evening, at the family residence, London Junction, and a jury empaneled as follows: George Cairncross (foreman), Chas. Clay, Wm. McCormick, Jas. Cottar, John A. Little, Robert Tremaine, David Clarke, Hiram Shane, Donald McDonald, Henry Taylor, Samuel Spicknell, John Slater and Maxwell Angus. Constable Ward summoned the witnesses. The jury viewed the body, and an adjournment was made until Wednesday evening, when the factory will be visited and evidence heard in relation to the accident.

The Great Northwestern Telegraph Company is advised that telegrams in code or cipher, whether government or private, are prohibited to or from Zanzibar, Seychelle Islands, Mauritius, Madagascar and any place in British East Africa, German East Africa, Mozambique, Portuguese East Africa, British Central Africa, Orange Free State, Transvaal, Cape Colony and Natal, also that telegrams in plain language will be subject to censorship and sender's risk.

TOO ANTI-BRITISH.

DECISION NEXT SUNDAY.

Rev. E. C. Oakley, of Detroit, who was extended a unanimous invitation to become pastor of the First Congregational Church some time ago, preached two able sermons at the anniversary services at that church yesterday. The evening congregation was the largest for some time, and the morning service was well attended. Mr. Oakley expressed himself as very much pleased with the church and its people. He stated that he would not, however, give his decision regarding the call until next Sunday, as there were a number of things to be considered. The members of the congregation were very much pleased with the man whom they hope will become their pastor. Mr. Oakley will be present at the anniversary tea and concert to be given in the school room of the church tonight, and will take this means of getting better acquainted with the congregation of the church.

IN THE WEST INDIES.

Rev. Dr. Johnston, of Jamaica, occupied the pulpit of the Adelaide Street Baptist Church last evening, and gave a most interesting address. Dr. Johnston has spent a quarter of a century in the West India Islands, principally in Kingston, where, as preacher, magistrate and member of the legislature, he has led a busy life. His account of the marvelous growth of Christianity in these islands was greatly encouraging to those who have the cause of Christ at heart. The reverend gentleman, in the course of his address, spoke of his trip across the African continent—four thousand miles—made on foot, and the perils of the journey. Mr. Johnston spent two years among the Boers, a number of them being in his employ. He is familiar with the causes that have led up to the present war, and expressed his firm conviction that Britain was fully justified in her determination to uphold the right of her subjects in that country without regard to race or creed. Mr. Johnston was listened to with the deepest attention throughout his impressive address. Miss Eddy Johnson gave a solo with very pleasing effect. Rev. Dr. Johnston is a brother of Mr. Johnston, of the firm of A. J. Watson & Johnston, Dundas street. He went to Jamaica almost broken in health, but in the salubrious climate of the West Indies has completely recovered.

The ceremony of consecration of the new high altar, just erected in the Catholic Church at Sarnia, will take place on Sunday, Nov. 28. The most Rev. D. O'Connor, D. OF MANHOOD AND PATRIOTISM

Rev. Dr. Smith Preached to the Seventh Battalion.

The Seventh Battalion, under the command of Major Little, paraded to the First Methodist Church yesterday morning. The men turned out in most gratifying numbers. On all occasions when the good name of the battalion is at stake, each company is on hand in full strength. It is apparent that every private in the ranks takes as deep an interest in the battalion as do the commanding officers.

The route of march was straight through Victoria Park to the church. Upon arriving there, each man was given a neat booklet containing the order of service, and having on its cover the arms and names of the officers of the Seventh, and the names of those who have gone from it to the Transvaal.

The service, in its entirety, was a most interesting one to all, and was especially so to those who are attracted by a military life. The music had been chosen with discretion and was appropriate throughout. Master Lloyd Ames, of Brantford, assisted the choir. He has a voice of rare sweetness, which, combined with excellent expression, rendered his singing most enjoyable.

Rev. Dr. Smith chose as the foundation for his sermon, the words, "For this man Mordecai waxed greater and greater," found in Esther, ix, 4. He would consider the growth and development of mankind. There was nothing greater than man, the image and superscription of God. His mighty genius defies all opposition. Even though the power and munificence of the firmament were pointed out to him, with the knowledge that one of those brilliant planets would shine in insignificance though worlds as vast as ours, yet for all that he would believe we are greater than they. An ideal manhood did not depend on mere physical development. The body was not the man. It was the mind which gave the electricity. It was not the skeleton, not even the brain, that made the man, not the nerve, but the conscience; not the outward appearance, but the heart. A man might have as towering a mind as a Byron, as fertile a mind as a Napoleon, but having also their debasing qualities, would be but imperfect as a man. It was his character that made the man. It was his rare, remarkable value. The requisites for character were then enumerated—the resolute, regal will, with the ability to accomplish truth, without the dangerous fallacy believing the doctrine that it mattered not what belief a man entertained so long as he was sincere in it; faith, the abiding trust in that which was unseen, but real; that revolted from the radical theory of the separation of mind from matter, and by which man attained to God through Christ, and gave to life its first impulse to success. These were but a few of the qualities that gave great character. At the church instanced the results of such character in the lives of Vicars, of Havelock, and of Gordon. He spoke of the causes leading up to the present war in South Africa, and prayed for the victory of the British, a victory that would insure for both Boer and British the inestimable privilege of living happily under the Union Jack. The reverend gentleman closed with a stirring appeal to the young men to allow their steps to be so guided as to insure a realization of the results of a noble and Christlike character.

AMONG THE MINERS.

At the first Presbyterian Church, yesterday, the pulpit was occupied by Mr. Wm. Beattie, who will graduate from Knox College next spring. Mr. Beattie is a strong and capable speaker, and his services were much enjoyed. The morning's discourse was on the petition in the Lord's Prayer, "Give us this day our daily bread." In the evening Mr. Beattie, who had been a missionary in the Shonan mining district of British Columbia, under the auspices of Knox College Missionary Society, gave a most graphic and interesting account of his pioneer missionary work among the miners and prospectors of the region named.
