A careful estimate of the number and armament of the Chinese troops around Pekin puts the number at 360,000, and it is calculated that these troops possess 220 7-centimetre Creusot guns, 18 Krupps and 150 Maxims. LANDED AT TAKU.

A Tsing Tau dispatch, dated the 24th, 8 p.m., says: Eight thousand allied troops have landed at Taku, including 1,200 Germans. A French officer, who has succeeded in getting through from Tien Tsin from Taku, says that the Russians alone have lost 150 killed and 300 wounded. The German gunboat litis, up the Pei Ho River, reports that masses of Chinese are near Tong Ku, and that an immediate attack is

The Shanghai correspondent of the Times sends the following under yesterday's date: A military correspondent at Taku says that the operations of the allies are suffering from the want of a recognized head, defective organization and the lack of transport. Mr. Kinder, the noted engineer, has arrived at Che Foo.

BRITISH CRUISERS SENT. The British admiralty has ordered five more cruisers to go to China. This represents an additional 50,000 tons, the crews aggregating 3,000.

STATEMENT IN THE COMMONS. London, June 25 .- In the House of Commons today, referring to the failure of the American and Russian forces to reach Tien Tsin, June 21, the par-liamentary secretary of foreign affairs, Mr. Brodrick, said that since then British troops from Hong Kong had arrived at Taku, and it was believed that 3,000 Japanese, 1,000 German and 2,000 French troops had also arrived there. But the government had no information re-

SENDING UNITED STATES TROOPS Washington, D. C., June 25.-The Chinese minister has asked an armistice in the sending of American troops to China, based on the assurance of Chinese viceroys that they can maintain order. President McKinley, while acknowledging his gratification at the assurances, has made known to the Chinese minister that the United States cannot relax its efforts to get troops to points where its officials are

considered in danger. A Che Foo dispatch, dated June 25, via Shanghai, says: United States Consul John Fowler has received from Rear-Admiral Kempff the following: Only one communication from Pekin has reached me since communications were interrupted on June 10. It was dated June 12. No direct or indirect news from the ministers since. About 430 foreign troops, including 56 American marines, went to Pekin ot guard the legations. A force of 100 Americans, uniting with a total force of 2,500 men of all nationalities represented here, went on June 10 to open the road and relieve Pekin. This movement was by permission of the Chinese government. The last news from the expedition was dated June 12, when the expedition was at Lang Fang.

BOXER ROORBACKS. At Canton the Boxers are spreading inflammatory pamphlets, a sample of which is the following: "Kill all Germans, French, Americans and Eng-To have peace prevail in the hearts of the people all foreigners should be driven out. This end can be attained in a few days if we unite out strength."

PRACTICAL REFORMS NEEDED. The London Times, reviewing the situation editorially, says: "There is no whisper in favor of the partition spoliation of China in this country or in the United States, but we feel very strongly that the time has come for the introduction of those practical reforms which Mr. Choate, in his recent letter to Lord Salisbury, declared to be desirable.'

CANADIAN MISSIONARIES. Toronto, June 26. - As each day passes without news from Pekin or Tien Tsin, the relatives of Miss Gowans and Miss Rutherford, the two Toronto women shut up in the Chinese capital, fear the worst. The ladies are missionaries of the Mission-ary Alliance, and Miss Gowans has been in Northern China for nine years. Both are members of well-to-do Toronto families, Miss Gowans being a daughter of John Gowans, assignee, and Miss Rutherford a daughter of Mrs. Eleanor Rutherford, 16 Gerard street east. Rev.
