No New Light on Pekin's Mystery

Li Hung Chang Says the Consuls Are Safe,

But an Advance on Pekin Would Be the Death-Herald of Every White Man in the Capital—The Regular Category of Contradictory Statements—Positive Proof Demanded as to the Safety of the Legation—Troops Landing Daily From India—France Sending 13,000—Canadian Missionaries Reach Che

Foo in Safety—Statements Made in the House of Commons.

IS LI LYING? New York, July 24.—Li Hung Chang, in a talk with a correspondent yesterday at Shanghai, is quoted in a copyrighted dispatch in the World as having said: "The members of the legations are still alive, but an advance of the allied troops upon Pekin from Tien Tsin would probably be the death herald of every white man in Pekin. Then the conservative element would be entirely overpowered by the radicals."

"The causes of the present situation were the lack of backbone and a wrong policy of the present Chinese government, while the drastic measures of the foreign powers aggravated the situation."

"We thank the Americans for their friendship, which we have always appreciated, and Admiral Kempf for his justice and forbearance in refusing to join in the bombardment of the Taku forts."

"We are trusting America to stand by the integrity of the Chinese Empire."

Earl Li further said that he could restore order with less than 20,000 white troops, and added: "The Boxers are a rabble not to be considered. I would turn to my side the imperial troops, too; but the powers do not want them, and would not permit it."

THE FRENCH CONTINGENT.

Paris, July 24.—The Matin today publishes full details regarding the expeditionary corps of France which will participate in the operations of the powers in China. The corps will consist of two brigades, one of marines under command of Gen. Frey, and the other supplied by the war department, commanded by Gen. Bailloud. The total French force will number 13,000.

IN THE DARK.

London, July 24.—There is nothing further this morning that throws light upon the mysterious situation. Two urgent dispatches were addressed yesterday by the Chinese minister to the Pekin government, and to the director of telegraphs, urging the necessity of restoring telegraphic communication with a view to enabling the powers to obtain proof of the safety of the foreign ministers. Until such proof is secured, no one here is inclined to alter the opinion that the Chinese are merely juggling to gain time.

TALK OF INDEMNITY.

Li Hung Chang is credited with a mission to offer to cede to the allied powers as indemnity for the Pekin outrages, and also to offer to restore order and to give facilities for trade with the outside world, on condition of the surrender of Kiao Chou, Wei Hai Wei and Manchuria by the powers, and the withdrawal of all missionaries. Little attention, however, need be paid to any of these rumors.

IN MANCHURIA.

St. Petersburg dispatches represent the situation in Manchuria as far more serious than had been supposed. It is asserted that the Chinese have occupied Hallar, where the Russian railway staff is surrounded, and in

RUSSIAN POLICY.

The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Daily Mail asserts that the differences of opinion in the Russian council of war. The minister of war, Gen. Kropotkin, wishes to send one hundred thousand men to clear the rebels out of Manchuria. On the other hand, according to this correspondent, Emperor Nicholas wishes the operations limited to the defense and pacification of the frontier districts.

"Let two strong armies, one of the Russians in the north, confront the Chinese, and the rising—so the czar is said to argue—'would be bound to collapse. We want no conquests,' he is reported to have declared at the conclusion of a sitting of the council."

"What we desire is to protect our frontiers and to steer into smooth waters the Chinese ship of state, now buffeted by the waves of civil war."

AT BERLIN.

The German Government and press continue to disbelieve the assurances of the Chinese authorities that the Pekin legations are safe. The foreign office surmises that the Conger dispatch was either sent about simultaneously with the dispatch of Dr. Von Bergemann, secretary of the German legation, and Sir Robert Hart, but suppressed, or was captured from the messenger to whom it was intrusted, and is now produced to create the desired effect in Washington; or, on the other hand, that the whole dispatch was concocted for purposes of deception with the aid of a cipher somehow obtained.

The German Government considers it unlikely that any advance on Pekin will be feasible before September.

CANADIANS AT CHE FOO.

Toronto, Ont., July 23.—The China Inland Mission (North American) has just received the following cable from China: "Chee O Kia Keo, Hsiang Hsen, Spa Ki Tien, King Tsi Kuan, Si Hui Huan, rioted; all destroyed; safe; Che Foo, who, 85 Chuan, exciting rumors prevailing. All well in Shanghai. Kin-Kiang, there is not much cause for anxiety at the present time. This means that so far, although many of the northern stations of the missions have been destroyed, no lives have been lost, and Che-Foo where the missionaries are gathered, is quiet. Word has already been received of the safety of Rev. Mr. Go-forth's party."

New York, July 23.—The Methodist Foreign Missionary Society of New York today received the following cable from China: "At the beginning of the month the foreign missionaries made several attempts to send messages out of Pekin; but, thanks to the strict watch kept on the city, the bearers were all caught and executed. On the 4th inst. only 400 foreigners, much exhausted, were left alive in Pekin; and one night, when the big guns were incessantly fired, it was known that all the legations and the foreigners were finished, although pretended telegrams contradicted these facts."

IN PARLIAMENT.

GOVERNMENT STATEMENTS.

London, July 24.—The House of Lords last evening passed to a second reading the bill empowering the Queen to prohibit the export of arms and ammunition, or either, to any country, when there is reason to believe that these or either may be used against the British forces or foreign forces co-operating with them.

In the House of Commons Parliamentary Secretary Brodick communicated certain statements of the Chinese authorities with regard to the safety of the legations at Pekin, and said the Chinese minister had declared the ministers to be unharmed. Mr. Brodick read the text of the imperial edict of July 18, and commenting on Minister Conger's dispatch, he said that though the dispatch was of the same as the edict's assurance of safety, the latter was not borne out by Mr. Conger.

Consul Warren had telegraphed to the governor of Shan Tung to know how a message from Pekin reached him in two days, and why there was no message from British Minister Macdonald. The governor had replied that the United States minister's message was sent by the Chinese foreign office, by a messenger traveling 60 leagues (roughly 200 miles) a day. "I assure you," the governor of Shan Tung had added, "there is no telegraphic communication. I cannot explain why Macdonald has not telegraphed, but I beg you not to be anxious about the ministers, for they and the others are all living and unharmed. On this I've already had several reliable messages."
