TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS.

The striking Toronto working jewellers
have decided to return to work.
Their grievances are to be considered
by their employers.

A full-blooded Chinese has been
nominated by the home rule or native
Union party for a reduction of the
House of Representatives in the Legisla-
ture of Hawaii.

Commander J. Snyman, a noted Boer
fighter, is in El Paso, Tex., en route
to the Rio Grande river in sections.
Diaz, relative to a large tract in Mexico
to be colonized by Boer refugees.

One thousand paper makers of the
E. B. Eddy Company, Hull, Que., have
filed a demand for a reduction of work-
ing hours. The night gang works 78
hours a week and wants a reduction
to 68 hours.

Orders are issued by the United
States war department directing that
the regular army be reduced to the
minimum size authorized by law, 59-
600 men. The present size of the army
is about 67,000 men.

Prof. Goldwin Smith has presented
a substantial residence on Beverley
street to the Nursing at Home Mis-
sion, valued at \$10,000.

The 7,000-ton steamer Minnetonka,
which was built in Cleveland and taken
to the St. Lawrence river in sections,
will load 200,000 bushels of wheat and
1,000,000 lbs. of lumber at Montreal
next week, bound for Liverpool.

The plans for the dry-docks at
Milwaukee have been approved by the
officials of the American Shipbuilding
Company. This dock is to be the
largest on the lakes and will be 600 feet
long, 70 feet wide, and 15 feet over the
miller sill.

After traveling from Warsaw,
Poland, to Chicago, Giesla and Bella
Bravotich, aged 13 and 16, respectively,
have been arrested for violation of
the United States immigration law,
they being considered dependents.
They came to Chicago to live with an
uncle.

President Roosevelt has determined
to stop some of the abuses that have
crept into the printing of reports and
documents of the Government offices
generally. He has issued a letter to
the various departments in which he
says that many of the reports accom-
plish no practical good and that there
is too much public printing generally.

Rev. Dr. McLaren, recently appointed
secretary of Presbyterian home mis-
sions, in his last encouraging sermon at
St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, said
that the dangers to Western Canada
are the Mormons and the Chinamen.

Dr. McLaren said that Jesse Knight,
the Mormon founder of Raymond City,
Alberta, was willing to spend at least
half of his \$700,000 to Mormonize
Canada.

Bishop McCabe, of the United States
Methodist Church, has just returned
to this country, after being absent for
eleven months, during which he has
visited the missions of Raymond City,
South America, Germany, Switzerland
and Denmark. His trip to Europe was
largely to enable Bishop Vincent, who
has charge of the missions in that
continent, to return to the United
States on business conducted with the
church.
