BROTHER DIED IN KASLO.
Speaking of the death of Mr. T. W.
Gerrard, of Kaslo, brother of Mr.
George Gerrard, manager of the Bank

denly. Mr. T. W. Gerrard died this morn-
ing. For the past week he had been

arose from his bed and spent the after-
noon around town. About 9 o'clock
this morning, while in conversation
with Mr. George Gilbert, he suddenly
expired. Mr. Gilbert called in Dr.
Rogers, who was immediately at the
bedside, but deceased had passed on
human aid. Death, it is understood,
was due to heart disease. The deceased
had resided in Kaslo for the past four
years."

episode was raging, and Stanley came
in for a good deal of adverse criticism.
His lecture here was a success, and a
large audience, and in it he referred
to the Bartlett and Throop charges,
refuting the allegations made against
himself. That was the last time he
was in this city, and he is now in
London, so far as is known. He arrived in
this city, with his party, in a special car
via the C. P. R.

CLASS WANTS MR.
CAMP TO RETURN
Unanimous Invitation Extended
at the Closing Session—
May Be Accepted.

A large audience assembled at the
Auditorium last night, it being the
closing session of the Union Bible
Class. Mr. Norman Camp, the speaker
of the evening, took the special subject, "Heaven"
—the future abode of the saved. There
was deep interest throughout, as the
speaker described the beauties of
the heavenly home, and spoke of the
blessed condition of those who at-
tained it. In our present state, he said,

1,500 miles square, was read from Re-

Heaven is above the earth, declared
the speaker, and is not connected with
the earth. There Christ is at present
in "light unapproachable, whom no
man hath seen, nor can see." Those
who are saved depart immediately to
be with Christ in paradise, in the third
month, where the glorified and con-
sciousness happiness, for the resurrec-
tion, when the glory shall be mani-
fested. God is preparing for a day of
glory, and the end of the world is
revealed and be rewarded, accord-
ing to their work. There will be de-
grees in glory and each one of those
who are saved shall be glorified ac-
cording to their work of faith here. In
heaven Christ's servants shall serve
him, bear his name, follow him, sing
the new song of the redeemed and see
him face to face.
At the close of the session, Mr.
A. McLean, the secretary of the class,
asked for an expression as to whether
the classes should be continued next
winter or not, giving it as his own
conviction that the work had been
much blessed of God. Mr. C. R. Som-
erville spoke of the blessing the class
had been in stimulating study,
and moved that Mr. Camp be urged to
continue the work next fall. This
motion was seconded by Mr. Robert Fox.
A standing ovation was given, and
unanimous. Mr. Camp thanked the
class for their expression of interest
in the work, and while he could not
then give a definite decision, he spoke
of the probability of a continuance of
the work next fall.
Mr. C. R. Somerville, Robt. Fox,
W. H. Liddicoat and C. B. Keenleyside
were chosen by the class as a commit-
tee to confer with Mr. Camp about his
return, and to make necessary ar-
rangements.
