Relics of Charles I.

Of few men are relics preserved with such religious care as those of Charles I. Probably the largest collection is that preserved at Ashburnham Place, the seat of the Earl of Ashburnham, consisting of the shirt with ruffled wrists (on which are a few faint traces of blood) in which he was beheaded, his white silk drawers, the sheet that was thrown over the body after execution, and a watch that was in his pocket at the time of his death, says the London Chronicle. In 1742 the Hon. Bertram Ashburnham bequeathed these relics to the parish clerk of Ashburnham, and for a long time they were carefully kept in a glass case in the chamber of Ashburnham Church. Many persons suffering from the king's evil resorted, even in the nineteenth century, to these relics for the cure of the disease.

ATTACKED BY THE BEASTS

Savage Pets Make an Onslaught On Their Trainers.

Two Men and a Woman Attacked to a Show Seriously Injured.

Cleveland, June 9.—Three animal taming acts which show animals had had thrilling experiences here Saturday with their savage pets, and as a result one man, the lion tamer, Jos. Morelli, was fatally injured with great holes in his abdomen made by the teeth of a lion. The others injured were Herman Wedder, whose right leg was lacerated by a leopard, and Madame Morelli, whose right arm and side were lacerated by a leopard. The animals had been shipped from Boston to this city and were early and early they were being transferred from the railway cars to their cages when the casualties happened.

Wedder was the first to be injured when he entered the cage of a big bear, which received him with a swipe of his immense paw, knocking him to the ground, where he lay pinned up on him and fastened his teeth into his leg, tearing off so large a chunk as to make necessary, surgeons say, amputation of the injured limb.

Madame Morelli, who entered her cage of leopards, was received in a similar manner to Wedder, only that one of her pets leaped upon her shoulder and lacerated her right arm severely. Madame Morelli was lying on the floor when the attendants came to her assistance, and with abject grooves the spotted beast off, not, however, without its making another attempt at the woman's life, for just as the door was about to be closed between the animal and the woman, the leopard again made a leap at her.

HORRIBLY LACERATED.

The lion tamer, McPhee, was watching the lions from the cage of the car to their cage, and because they refused to move promptly he entered the cage. He had hardly entered before a lion leaped upon him, pinning him to the floor. The lion placed his great paws upon the fallen man's breast and tore his right leg in a fearful manner, the tendons being pulled from the bone.

The efforts of the attendants to drive the lion off with pikes had no effect, and the lion continued to maul the man, for he quickly pushed his big jaws and sharp teeth into McPhee's abdomen, and when he released him, the lion's abdomen was torn so badly that his entrails were in sight.

The lion was finally driven off, and McPhee was removed to the hospital, dead then alive. He was removed to an improvised hospital arrangement, and physicians who were called say that he is surely fatally injured.

Male Valets.

A new manifestation of the servant question is the substitution by women while traveling of a valet or a trained nurse for a lady's maid.

"Of course, the duties of a woman's valet and a lady's maid are not exactly the same, and the difference seems to be that those of the valet are more inclusive."

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THE METROPOLIS IN GRATEFUL MOOD

Thanksgiving Services in St. Paul's and Other Churches.

KING AND QUEEN TAKE PART And Were Joined at the Cathedral by Others of the Royal Family.

London, June 8.—The noisy jubilation with which London has resounded for the last week has succeeded today by more subdued, although not less impressive, public demonstrations of thankfulness for the return of peace in South Africa. The thanksgiving services in London today were typical of the services held throughout the empire, but the presence of King Edward and other members of the royal family at the principal devotional service in London and the progress of the royal personages to and from St. Paul's Cathedral through cheering thousands of British subjects and visitors in London, gave thanksgiving day in the metropolis an added feature of a notable historic occasion.

MORNING PROGRAMME.

The programme of this morning was not intended to be accompanied by special ostentation. King Edward and Queen Alexandra did not pass through the streets even in semi-state, but rode to St. Paul's in an ordinary landau, drawn by four horses, accompanied by his immense staff, and by members of the royal family who reside in Buckingham Palace accompanied their majesties.

The Prince of Wales and others proceeded to St. Paul's separately, but by the same route as did their majesties. The King and the Queen were joined at the cathedral by the Prince and Princess of Wales and many other distinguished personages. Although the weather was chilly the streets for the entire distance from the palace to the cathedral were thickly lined with people, who bared their heads and cheered as the royal family passed.

THE KING WARMLY GREETED.

King Edward, who wore the uniform of a field marshal, was greeted with enthusiasm, and his majesty, the Prince of Wales and the other princes were warmly greeted in acknowledging salutations from the crowd.

Lord Roberts, who drove with his wife and daughters, was one of the most conspicuously greeted with cheers.

At Temple Bar officials of the city of London, for the first time since the jubilee of the late Queen Victoria, awaited the sovereign in state.

The lord mayor of London, Sir Joseph C. Dimsdale, presented the sword of the city to his majesty and uttered a loyal welcome. The King returned the sword, bowed and simply remarked, "Thank you, very much."

The streets leading to St. Paul's Cathedral were densely crowded with people, and a number of persons fainting in the crush outside the barriers which had been erected in the cathedral.

THE KING AND QUEEN.

The King and Queen Alexandra alighted at the west entrance of St. Paul's. Here they were received by the Bishops of Stepney and London, and conducted by them to their seats, which were under the dome of the building, and directly in front of the pulpit. The seats in the choir stalls were occupied by the members of the present cabinet and by members of the former cabinets. These gentlemen in their dark clothes formed a somber group in the great gathering, in which the uniforms of officials, the military and naval uniforms, and the various uniforms of the members of the House of Lords and members of the House of Commons were seated in opposite sides under the dome.

Their majesties entered the cathedral to the accompaniment of the hymn, "Onward, Christian Soldiers," by the organ and the choir, and the throng of worshippers rose and heartily joined in the singing. The cathedral organ at this morning's service was reinforced with brass instruments.

A notable feature of the musical service was the rendition of a "Te Deum" composed by the late Sir Arthur Sullivan for a thanksgiving peace service. Following the thanksgiving collects, at the request of King Edward, the hymn, "God Our Help in Ages Past," was sung to the tune of "Old Hundred." The sermon by the Bishop of Stepney was short and simple, and was preached from the text, "The blessing of peace."

The service was concluded with the singing of the National Anthem. The members of the royal family accompanied from the cathedral to Buckingham Palace by way of the Victoria Embankment, and King Edward and the other royal personages received ovations all along the route.

AT BERLIN.

Berlin, June 8.—The thanksgiving service for the conclusion of peace in South Africa, held in the English Church here today, was attended by the members of the British embassy at Berlin, Andrew D. White, the United States ambassador, and John B. Jackson, secretary of embassy.
