EXHIBITION PROBE

Judge Winchester Hands in Report of His Investigation.

Toronto, June 30.—Judge Winchester's report on the investigation of the affairs of the Industrial Exhibition Association was sent to the mayor this afternoon. His honor enclosed a check for \$1,255.60 from Col. J. Knox Leslie, the former treasurer of the exhibition association being the balance due by the former treasurer out of a sum of \$2,243.10, of which \$957.50 had been paid to the association by Col. Leslie.

This was in addition to the former shortage of about \$10,000. The judge recommends that all checks be countersigned by the president of the association or in his absence by the vice-president, and that greater care be taken by the executive committee in the expenditure of money. He recommends a better system of keeping the accounts, and he severely criticizes the special auditors, appointed by the city, to audit the accounts of the association for their work thereon.

CUSTOMS RETURNS ARE \$11,731 TO THE GOOD

Figures for the Month of June for Port of London Are Very Satisfactory.

The customs returns for the month of June totalled \$82,951.90, an increase of \$11,731.29 over those of June, 1909, bringing the receipts for the half-year almost up to the half-million mark. The total for the six months of 1910 is \$499,825.54, one of the best half-years in the city's history, and \$70,214.99 greater than the first six months of 1909, when the figures totalled \$429,610.55. The returns for June, 1909, were \$1,220.61. Every month's returns this year show a substantial increase over those of last year. Following are the figures:

THE MISSING GRAFTER SAID TO BE ALIVE

Friend of Frank Gouldthritte Says Missing Man Will Return to Ottawa.

Ottawa, June 30.—A friend of Frank Gouldthritte, the missing superintendent of the stationery branch of the Printing Bureau, stated this morning that he had it on good authority that Gouldthritte is still alive, and that he will shortly return to Ottawa to face the charges against him. This man claims that the suicide episode was arranged by Gouldthritte and a friend simply as an expedient to gain time.

Locally there have been no new developments. Hon. Charles Murphy is continuing the investigation at the bureau, and the Dominion police are still hopeful of tracing Gouldthritte alive.

A rumor was in circulation that Gouldthritte's young son had been spirited away, but this is denied by the woman in whose house he has been.

Mrs. Gouldthritte was expected home today, but did not arrive.

A Detroit dispatch states she was in Detroit last night, and that she identified the article of clothing found on the boat and the writing in the hat as those of her husband.

In his "Life of Gladstone," Lord Morley somewhere notes that Mr. Gladstone affirmed that he did not remember ever to have been at a loss for a word.

BOARD OF WORKS GRANTED REQUEST

Recommended That the Bell Telephone Co. Be Allowed to Construct Conduits.

THE MAYOR'S POSITION

Says the City is Morally Bound to Concede the Demand of the Telephone People.

The request of the Bell Telephone Company, to place extra conduits along Richmond street and other streets, was again a topic of conversation at the meeting of the board of works last night, and once again it was recommended to the council that the request be granted.

Manager Beard was present, and informed the board that some years ago, about 20 in fact, the company outlined a plan to place their wires underground in London. They met the city, and they were given permission. Agreements to that effect were drawn up, and since that time they had been following out that plan. To place their wires in the same conduits with the city's would mean that their whole scheme would have to be changed, and a great deal of unnecessary expense incurred. The company would not place their wires in the same set of conduits with high tension wires.

The Mayor's Position.

Mayor Beattie thought the city owed a moral obligation to the company. When the agreement was drawn up, it was understood that the city should at least carry out their part, even if a legal technicality intervened.

Ald. Tancock thought that the board should do nothing until the water commissioners took some action.

After some discussion, it was moved by Ald. Saunders, seconded by Ald. Pocock, that the company be given the right to lay underground wires, and it was carried.

The city solicitor, in a written opinion, says that the company cannot put down conduits without the consent of the city, and Water Commissioner Pocock declares that the city should guard its rights and not grant the request.

CHAS. FORRESTER IS PROMOTED

Popular London Official Is Made Trainmaster of 15th and 20th Districts of G. T. R.

IS GOING TO STRATFORD

Other London Men Are Advanced as a Result of the Resignation of Mr. J. A. McLardy.

Chief Dispatcher Charles Forrester, of the Grand Trunk, received word from headquarters yesterday of his appointment as trainmaster of the fifteenth and twentieth districts, comprising the lines from Toronto to Saranac Tunnel and the Buffalo and Goderich line.

Mr. Forrester's headquarters will be at Stratford, and he will take over his new position today.

Night Chief Dispatcher White succeeds Mr. Forrester as chief dispatcher, and Mr. C. Rutherford will succeed Mr. White.

Mr. Wilson, chief dispatcher at Stratford, will be trainmaster of the 22nd and 23rd districts, with headquarters at Palmerston.

George Stokes, dispatcher at Stratford, will be chief dispatcher at Palmerston, and it is the intention to place a staff of operators there.

W. Brown, of this city, will succeed Mr. Wilson at Stratford.

Mr. McLardy Resigns.

All the above changes have been made as a result of the resignation of Mr. J. A. McLardy, trainmaster at Stratford, who goes to Winnipeg to accept a more important position on the Grand Trunk Pacific.

Mr. McLardy went to Stratford from St. Thomas about a year ago. In St. Thomas he was trainmaster for the Wabash.

Mr. Forrester came to London from Hamilton twelve years ago. For seven years he was a dispatcher, and was then made night chief. He held this position for two years, and for the last three years has been chief. He is known as one of the best operators on the Grand Trunk, and is one of the best-liked railroad men in the company's employ. He has a host of friends here who, while regretting to lose him, will rejoice at his splendid promotion.

THE PORCUPINE CAMP

Curtiss Drops Twenty Bombs, Hitting Mark Eighteen Times.

Ottawa, June 30.—That unfortunately a "wild boom" seems certain, that already prices of claims are away above any determined value, and that the buying or selling is on a speculative rather than a business basis, is an excerpt from an official report which has just been issued by Mr. R. W. Brock, director of the geological survey on the Porcupine gold district in Northern Ontario.

Porcupine is yet in the prospect stage, but it has some of the essential qualities of a gold camp, sufficient to have induced experienced men to take up claims at high figures and to undertake large expenditures to determine if it possesses all the essential factors. Access to the district for travellers is now comparatively easy.

AEROPLANE IN WARFARE

District Has Gold, But Present Boom Is Not Justified.

Hammondsport, N. Y., June 30.—To demonstrate the effectiveness of the aeroplane in naval warfare Glenn Curtiss, the aviator, made several flights in a biplane over Lake Kouka today in the presence of Admiral Arthur Kimball, of the navy department at Washington, and dropped twenty bombs at marks.

He is credited with having hit the mark eighteen times in the twenty trials. Admiral Kimball is said to have expressed himself as greatly impressed with the possibilities of the aeroplane in warfare.

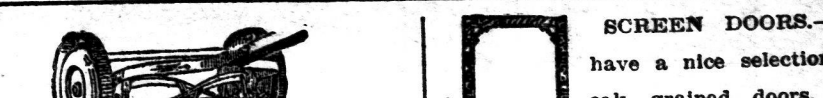

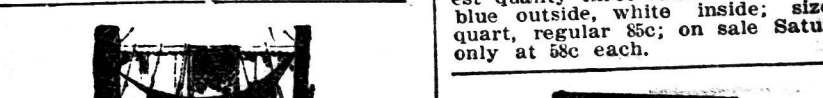
