

TORONTO TELEGRAM STILL AFTER BORDEN

Says Cochrane's Preference Has Signed Death Warrant of 20 Conservative M. P.'s.

Toronto, Oct. 12.—The Toronto Telegram, Conservative, continues to assail the Borden cabinet. In its issue last night it says sarcastically: "Monk, J. Cochrane, 2; R. L. Borden also ran, in this apparent result of the first heat in the race for the mastery of the Administration. Would Bourassa & Co. consent to let Canada's Parliament present Britain with a Dreadnought, to be built at Canada's expense and named after R. L. Borden, the fighter who conquered R. L. Borden on the occasion of his first engagement?"

And Hon. Frank Cochrane, "the Man who Brought Bourassa to Suburbia," is the sort of leader the Tories only the slaughter. Hon. Frank's first act of leadership at Ottawa having signed the death warrant of at least 20 Conservative M. P.'s from this province.

SIX COATS WERE STOLEN FROM EAST LONDON SHOP

Mystery Surrounds the Theft of \$50 Worth of Garments.

Shortly before noon today, someone walked into the tailorshop of John Armour, 669 Dundas street, East London, while Mr. Armour was out for a few minutes, and stole six coats, including a brand new overcoat, and two vests. The thief overlooked several pairs of trousers that were hanging in another part of the shop. Mr. Armour stated to The Advertiser that he had just left the shop for a few minutes, and when he returned he immediately noticed that something was wrong. A hurried investigation revealed the loss of the coats. The police were notified, and detectives were soon on the scene.

It is also stated that the thief entered the shoe shop of Geo. Huddleston, next door to the tailorshop, and took a new pair of shoes. Mr. Huddleston was in his shop all morning and had several customers call, and he thinks that the shoes must have been snatched up while his back was turned.

It is altogether likely that an arrest will be made this afternoon in connection with the robbery. The police have a clue to the thief, it was stated to The Advertiser, and it is said on good authority that he was seen coming down on a car with the coats on his arm. He transferred at the corner of Dundas and Dundas streets, and the police have a good description of him. Detectives Down and Eggleston are following up the clue, and an arrest is surely expected.

Church and Home Theme Discussed Social Service One of the Present Demands Upon the Church.

[Canadian Press.] Toronto, Oct. 12.—With the Church in the Household as the general topic for consideration by the Ecumenical Methodist Conference in this city today, the programme of addresses included "Home Religion and Religious Education in the Home," by Rev. W. B. Lark, of Bude, England; "Methods of Religious Training in the Home," by Rev. D. S. Bedford, of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of the United States; "The Family Altar," by Dr. Richard T. Smith, of London, England; "The Psychology of Child Training," by Rev. H. M. Hamill, Nashville, Tenn.; "The Widening Mission of the Sunday School," by Rev. J. H. Freeman, of Pittsburgh, Pa.; and "The Equipment of the Sunday School Teacher," by J. H. Freeman, of the Wesleyan Reform Union.

The American and Canadian delegates, especially from the larger cities, are getting much valuable data from the papers read by English delegates regarding methods in so-called slum-work and in practical application of the principles of Christian socialism. Much of this information will be put in a preventive way.

According to Rev. George P. Eckman, of St. Paul's Methodist Church, New York, "one of the conspicuous needs of the day in our work is disinterested social service. The social settlement already is showing to the state its utility and to the church its opportunities. A quiet invasion for good is being conducted in the dark spots of the world where social injustice is rampant. We must make impossible in the new world some of the defeated diseases of the old world."

Dr. Scott Liddett, warden of the Bermuda Settlement, London, has formulated for the newer workers among the delegates what he terms the two main principles for successful settlement work. "First, the necessity of friendship—the principle of brotherhood, not extended in a patronizing spirit, but in real comradeship; secondly, the necessity of sharing with less fortunate fellow-men the benefits of religion, culture and education."

Among the most efficient fields of work in large cities is the downtown church, according to Rev. J. G. Bickerton, of Philadelphia, who sees great field of effort in the ministry which can be duplicated. "When those churches in the big centres are sold for gain and the congregations move to more desirable districts," he believes that "they should remember to fulfill their mission as centres of light and social regeneration in those areas which otherwise the shadows must fall."

HOLIDAY DELAYS

M'NAMARA TRIAL The Defense Will Continue to Question Venimen On Trade Unionism.

[Canadian Press.] Los Angeles, Oct. 12.—Columbus Day, a legal holiday in this state, halted today the trial of James B. McNamara, under indictment for the murdered nineteen men in the explosion of the Times building here a year ago. When court resumes tomorrow the examination of witnesses will be taken up where interrupted at the opening of the session of the trial yesterday morning.

The offices of the two squads of attorneys presented a busy scene notwithstanding the official respite, and it was apparent that both sides have not yet made ready for the more important day of the trial, when the testimony of witnesses will be received.

In the McNamara case, James B. McNamara and his brother, John J., indicted likewise with him, and awaiting a separate trial, were the twelve defendants in the Times building explosion a year ago. When court resumes tomorrow the examination of witnesses will be taken up where interrupted at the opening of the session of the trial yesterday morning.

Wu Chang escaped over the walls and are known to be safe. Two distinct races. Much of the unrest and racial disaffection in China in recent years has been due to the underlying current of race hatred, which the native Chinese have been quick to pick up and use in the nationalistic network of officials. Although the Manchus swept down from the north and took possession of the Chinese throne nearly 300 years ago, there has been little mixing of their blood with that of the native Chinese, and the two people have existed side by side, two continually clashing elements.

The Manchus were originally called in to assist in suppressing internal revolts, but they refused to withdraw, but proceeded to conquer the country for their own ends. In 1911, they proclaimed the son of the late ruler as the first emperor of a new dynasty, the tenth emperor of which now reigns.

SHIP'S CARGO INCREASES \$107,000 DURING VOYAGE

Advances in Sugar Prices Causes Big Gain For Owners. [Canadian Press.] Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 12.—Unusual interest was manifested in the arrival of the British steamship Kwara, with sugar, from Java, today, by reason of the fact that the vessel's cargo increased in value in transit more than \$107,000. The Kwara sailed from Java on Aug. 1, bound for the McWhan refinery here. When she left Java she was carrying the six thousand tons of sugar were put on board the value per 112 pounds was 14s 6d. Yesterday's quotations for Java sugar were 15s 6d. The advance of 4s in the price will net the owners \$107,140 over the original purchase price of the cargo.

The duty paid on the Kwara's cargo totalled \$180,000, or on a basis of 320 per ton.
