In drawing threads for Mexican work r hemstitching it saves much time and trouble to draw the thread from the middle of the space first; after this two threads, one on each side of the drawn ore, may be pulled out at once.

Dainty handkerchiefs can be liberally supplied out of the piece bag if care is taken of the

Before beginning to embroider the dges of towels outline the edge of the scallops with a small stitch done on the sewing machine. The buttonholing covers the stitching perfectly and gives a very firm edge that is unobtainable in any other way. When padding scalloped edges for towelling use tiny rolls of raw cotton instead of the usual darning cotton. This is sewed in place with fine thread. It makes a satisfactory and thick padding.




