SCHEME TO ASSIST WEST LONDON BRIDGE

Have Water Commission Pay Part of Cost.

Dr. H. A. Stevenson, of the water commission, is out with a suggestion that the commission contribute something towards the construction of the West London bridge.

"It is claimed that \$20,000 will not pay the whole cost," said the commissioner. "The water commissioners could contribute something, I am sure. They will need the bridge for stringing their whes on, and in the future it will be necessary to use the bridge for carrying a water main. They could afford to pay part of the cost and the scheme would be a decided gain to all parties. The city council itself might also contribute, as it will be necessary before many years to have a sewer pipe cross the river to drain West London. These matters should be gone into thoroughly, in my judgment."

A MOTOR AMBULANCE FOR FOREST CITY

Present Horse-Drawn Vehicle Has More Than It Can Do. It Is Pointed Out.

The necessity for better ambulance equipment in London is being made the subject of an agitation that will bring the matter to the attention of the city council.

Several times during the past year it has been found impossible to obtain an ambulance for emergency work, the most recent case being in the death of a woman in West London a couple of weeks ago.

A police officer passing a Dundas street house learned that a few minutes previously a woman rendered temporarily insane by despondency, had taken a dose of carbolic acid. He phoned immediately for the police ambulance, but found that it was not available at the time. Efforts were then put forth to obtain a physician, and despite the fact that the woman lived for over an hour, she received no medical attention. Otherwise it is possible that her life could have been saved.

The horse-drawn ambulance is said to be rather antiquated in a city of London's proportions at this time, and its chief use is in taking persons suffering from ordinary illnesses to the hospitals, or from the hospitals to their homes. The same team of horses is used for the police patrol, and if one piece of apparatus happens to be on a call, the other is not available until the return of the horses. Chief Williams and a number of aldermen are of the opinion that some provision should be made for emer-gency work, as the different private ambulances are rather slow in re-

sponding as a rule.

Motor equipment is the only answer to the problem, they claim, and with a modern ambulance mounted on an auto chassis for the purpose, an efficient service, not too costly to maintain would be afforded.


