Coming of Connaught.

For the first time in the history of Canada a prince of the blood, one of the illustrious family to whom we owe willing allegiance, becomes our Governor-General. The people of Canada appreciate highly the fact that he is a son of the ever-to-be-revered and august lady, Queen Victoria, and the brother of his late majesty King Edward, the Peacemaker, who held the confidence and affection of all his subjects and the respect and admiration of the civilized world.

The Coronation.

Since the last meeting of the Legislature the coronation of the Most Gracious Majesties King George V. and his royal consort Queen Mary, has been celebrated in solemn and imposing ceremony, representatives from all parts of the Empire having assembled at Westminster Abbey to join therein. This province was represented on the auspicious occasion by its first minister, along with myself and the minister of agriculture and many of its prominent citizens.

On the labors of the husbandman the prosperity of the province mainly rests, and though there has been in some localities room for disappointment in the harvest, on the whole our earnest thanks are due to Almighty God for varied bountiful returns and general evidence of prosperity.

The T. and N. O.

Manifestations of the steadily increasing enterprise and desirable activities of our people are to be seen everywhere and are subjects of congratulation. By way of illustration—the net earnings of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway for the year ending Dec. 31, 1911, amounted to \$595,000, against \$420,000 for the previous year. The branch of the railway to Porcupine has been completed, and there are now three hundred miles of the railway in operation, while another branch line is being located from the main line to Elk Lake. An agreement has been signed into between the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway Commission and the Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada, granting the latter running rights over the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway in consideration of which the company, in addition to assuming an equitable share of the cost of the general maintenance of the road, agreed to pay the sum of \$300,000 per annum as rental for such running rights—this sum representing one-half of the interest on the full cost of the line.

Central and Hydro.

The erection of the new Central Prison buildings at Guelph has been commenced. A large part of the work is being done in the prison, and the result fully justified the experiment of treating the prisoners as not unworthy of trust. The board of parole instituted by our Government has proved to be an unequalled success, and great good has already resulted from its work.

The great scheme for the utilization of hydro-electric power in the public interest has, after many vicissitudes, been accomplished and is now in full and successful operation in the western part of the province, and steps are now being taken by my Government to extend the operation of the commission to central, northern and eastern Ontario.

Mines and Agriculture.
The output of our silver mines has continued to increase during the past year, until now Ontario stands third in point of production among the silver-producing communities of the world, the entire output yielding an increase of the world's production, and the prospects of the gold-mining districts at Porcupine are very promising.
The very important work of practical demonstration carried out on livestock, dairying, fruit-growing and the growing of field crops, by the district representatives of the department of agriculture, has been continued and increased, and

DEALING WITH INTOXICATED MEN

A New Plan Is Suggested by Local Parties Who Would Improve Conditions.

CASES IN THE COURTS

Money Which Should Go to the Families of the Prisoners Is Used Up in Fines.

A plan for dealing with intoxicated men and others guilty under the law of minor offences, who are now cast into jail on sight by the police is being suggested by several Londoners who are desirous of seeing a "moral system" established, such as has made somewhat of a reputation for Chief of Police Kohler, of Cleveland, during the past few years.

While no person has attempted to condone drinking to excess, and some of those interested in the plan are prominent temperance workers, it is pointed out that drunkards, who are not habitual offenders, could be dealt with as satisfactorily in another way.

The scheme suggested is to have the police, when at all convenient, conduct intoxicated men to their own homes where they are found on the streets. If they have been guilty of any offence that merits punishment, particularly names may be taken and summonses issued, calling upon them to appear in court at a certain time.

Hard on the Family.

The average man who is charged with drunkenness in police court, admits the offence and is discharged, lightly fined, or penalized so heavily that he is either compelled to pay up the money that should go to the support of his family, or leave his wife and children to struggle along without him for fifteen days to a month.

The punishment for the offender in the majority of cases adds to the troubles of the innocent wife and children. Many, it is admitted, are no loss, but on the other hand there are men who drink and who at the same time behave themselves comparatively well about home, and support their families fairly comfortably.

If they are fined for transgression of the city bylaws, they pay up the money that is sorely needed at home, and if they do not take the time in jail, perhaps at no great inconvenience to themselves, who become the scapegoats of the neighborhood, and are thrown upon the streets while the mother goes out to earn the living.

A Sad Condition.

At the expiration of the time the men return from the cells from the vermin-covered, and add to the woes of the household.
The suggestion to substitute the summons for street arrests is so strongly supported here, and the matter will probably be brought to the attention of the city authorities within a very short time.

DREANEY AVE. MAN STRUCK BY A CAR

Albert Prince Suffered Fracture of Leg in the East End Yards.

Albert Prince, of 2 Dreaney avenue, who has been employed a short time about the Grand Trunk roundhouse, suffered a fracture of his leg and minor cuts and bruises yesterday afternoon, when he was struck by a car while shovelling snow on one of the sidings. He is now at Victoria Hospital, and will be laid up for some weeks.

Prince, an Englishman, who is a molder by trade, secured employment at the roundhouse recently, and yesterday was sent out to remove the snow from the tracks about the big building.
As he worked about a car was moved against him in some manner, causing him to fall. At the time a break beam caught his leg, crushing the bones. Prince was removed to Victoria Hospital and attended by Dr. H. A. Stevenson.

The injured man is forty years of age.
