TORONTO, April 23.—The 'run at the Union stockyards today totalled 70 lots, with 95 head of cattle, 379 calves, 100 sheep and lambs and 1,272 hogs. Market prices were from 10c to 1.50 per lb. on many grades, except for one or two very choice lots. At yesterday's market the buyers thought prices were too high and did not bid. However, so that today there were abnormally heavy. 1,000 head of cattle from Tuesday, which was added to another like amount, helped the buyers in their attempt to bring the

quotations. Good to choice, continued steady firm but common medium butchers' cows were 40c and lower. There was a demand for stockers and cows for grass feed.
