Ans.—Here is a list as complete as I

can find: Lily of the valley, unconscious sweetness; pansies, thoughts; primrose, inconstancy; red rose, love; white rose, I am worthy of you; yellow rose, jealousy; moss rosebud, confession of love; smilax, constancy; verbena, pray for me; ferns, fascinating; golden rod, be cautious; heliotrope, devotion; ivy, friendship; columbine, folly; daisy, innocence; carnation, affection; camellia, loveliness; canyfluit, indifference; china aster, variety; four-leaf clover, be mine; white clover, think of me; red clover, industry; water-lily, purity of heart; white hyacinth, loveliness; purple hyacinth, sorrow; mignonette, your qualities surpass your charms; tuberoses, dangerous pleasures; sweet pea, depart.

Several fancies are connected with the manner of presenting a flower. For instance, a rosebud is divested of thorns, but retains its leaves, conveying the sentiment "I fear no longer; I hope." If a flower is offered reversed, its original signification is reversed, and the opposite sentiment implied. "Yes" is to be understood by touching the flower given to the lips; "No" by pinching off a petal and casting it away.

Making Hop Yeast.

Dear Miss Grey,—This is my first letter. Please answer the following questions. What is the address of the maker of the Fleischman's yeast cake?

2. How to iron a shirt to make it stiff and shiny?

3. How do you make hop yeast? Do you keep your jar air tight?

Ans.—1. You could write to the Ont-

tario branch office at Toronto, or address the head office in New York City. I do not know the street address, but feel sure your letter would reach them without it.

2. Some of our household readers may like to give hints for this, according to methods they have found good. Some find this gives an excellent gloss to shirt-bosoms: Take two parts spermaceti and one part of white wax; heat moderately till they are melted together. To use, add a piece of this mixture the size of a walnut to each quart of starch.

3. Take a quart of water, and steep a small handful of hops in it; let it simmer for twenty minutes. The liquid will be reduced to three pints or so. Place half a cup of flour in a deep vessel or crock, and strain this "hop" water over the dry flour, add a tablespoon of salt, and stir well. Dissolve a yeast cake in a cupful of lukewarm water, and when the hop and flour mixture is lukewarm or cooler, stir in the yeast cake and water; be sure to have it thoroughly mixed in. Let the yeast rise overnight, then stir it down, and put in the yeast jar.

The yeast jar should be a stone one, if possible; keep it in a very cool place, tightly covered, as if any air gets in the yeast will "work" and be spoiled. A cupful of this yeast may be used to "lighten" the next batch of yeast that you may wish to make.

I sincerely hope you may find this helpful.

Ans.—No "Sandy" is to have a birthday party is he? Bless his heart. Since you have arranged for some outdoor games, these may come in good if it proves a dull or damp day:

1. Tell one of the children to call himself the "cobbler" and sit on the floor while the others join hands and dance around him. The cobbler says: "Now is the time to try your shoes, and at once, but without leaving his seat reaches for the feet of one in the ring while the players who must not let go of hands, endeavor to dance out of his reach. If one is caught he or she becomes the cobbler. Another amusement would be a peanut party. Arrange tables as for a progressive card game, place a generous hand of peanuts (in the shell) in the centre of each table and provide a pair of tongs like those that come in boxes of candy, for each player. The game is to see how many can be removed without disturbing another. When one is moved the player gives up and the next one tries. White Cookies.—Three eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup lard or butter, flavoring to taste, 2 cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder; if thought too rich for everyday use, add part of cup sweet milk.

Do Cookies.—One cup brown sugar, 1 cup lard, 1 cup molasses, 1 teaspoon ginger; put on the stove and let boil five minutes; when cool, add two beaten eggs, half teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon baking soda moistened with 1 tablespoon vinegar, 2 cups flour, or enough to roll out without sticking.

Re-Elected President of Women's Sanatorium Aid

Women's Sanatorium Aid Society Elect Officers—Fine Work Done During Year.

Mrs. John Stevely and Mrs. B. C. McCann were unanimously re-elected as president and secretary, respectively, of the Women's Sanatorium Aid Society, at the annual meeting held this week. Other officers elected were: First vice-president, Mrs. (Dr.) Ziegler; second vice-president, Mrs. Vaughan; third vice-president, Mrs. J. Stevenson; treasurer, Mrs. A. B. Greer. Mrs. Charles White received a standing vote of thanks for her efforts during the year in attending to, unaided, the collection of papers and magazines, the revenue from this alone enabling the society to relieve much distress.

A splendid idea of the work done by the society was given by the report of the secretary, Mrs. McCann:

"It has been my privilege for the last five years to submit each year a report of the work accomplished during the preceding year, and each report shows evidence of our society and the increased demand in the work and sympathy of the members. Owing to the fact that the law, requiring that persons suffering from tuberculosis be placed in hospitals and sanatoriums, has not been enforced, many new cases of infection have been found in the families of these unfortunate people, and are now under the care of this society. In Toronto and Hamilton, I am informed that the regulations have been vigorously carried out with very satisfactory results."

\$2,500 From Rose Day.

The members have much reason for congratulation upon the success of their "Queen Alexandra Rose Day," when the handsome sum of \$2,500 was raised by the sale of roses. This enabled the society to pay the balance required to make up the \$10,000, our promised subscription to the building fund of the sanatorium. The completion of the building of the sanatorium in June was a source of great satisfaction to our members, who had worked so hard to do their part in this magnificent work.

The building was formally opened by Sir John Gibson, lieutenant-governor of Ontario, and Lady Gibson. In the presence of many distinguished guests, all of whom seemed deeply interested in the new building and the work of our society. It was found that there were enough children in the treatment to almost fill the institution.

Demands Heavy.

During the past winter the demands of the funds of our society have been very heavy. Twenty-five quarts of milk have to be provided each day, and a cot maintained in the sanatorium for the year. An unusual number of men were out of work, and in cases under our care, we had to provide many necessities to the members of the families to prevent actual suffering. Miss Hanson, our visiting nurse, has been untiring in her efforts to prevent distress among her patients and their families, numerous cases of real destitution came under her notice while doing the work of the society, and their wants were kindly supplied through the efforts of the members and their friends. Miss Hanson's work and her devotion to the poor and suffering is thoroughly known to and much appreciated by the members. Many cases of persons who would suffer in silence rather than apply for relief have been found and visited by Miss Hanson, and have been assisted and cheered by her visits. The number attending the clinics at Victoria Hospital has increased so largely that it has been found necessary to have an assistant nurse, and the London Health Association has appointed Miss Barrons, who has proved to be a most capable and able co-worker with Miss Hanson.

Helping the Kiddies.

Finding that the children of the sanatorium were in need of winter clothing, the work of supplying the same was immediately commenced, and the members purchased and contributed large quantities of material, which were made into warm garments for the children. To these were added mitts, toques, sweaters, stockings and other articles, the gifts of generous friends and citizens. At Christmas time the children were made happy by a Christmas tree loaded down with suitable gifts and delicacies for each and every child. Mrs. Flanders and Miss Flemings, with the bright young members of their Sunday school class, had the whole arrangement in hand, and the satisfaction of knowing how well their good work was appreciated. The sum of one hundred and sixty-two dollars (\$162) was sent to us at Christmas time, being contributions from the various societies and generous citizens interested in our work. As no appeal was made this year, the receipt of the money was particularly appreciated.

Thank Local Press.

All our efforts to carry on the great work of the society in assisting to stamp out the ravages of the dread tuberculosis have been aided by the kindness of the proprietors of the newspapers, who on all occasions have been unsparing in their efforts to bring our appeals to the notice of a generous public. In this report, I have found it impossible to give the names of the societies, the merchants and friends who have contributed clothing, money and otherwise ably assisted us. I have mentioned the names of the citizens who have saved all their papers and magazines, from the sale of which our society derives an ably considerable income. You are, however, aware that all gifts of money have been acknowledged, and particulars of the same recorded in the minute book."
