BRAWL BRINGS THREE ARRESTS

Sir Adam's Doctor Refuses To Try New Anaemia Powder

FURTHER ARRESTS EXPECTED

Drunken Brawl Last Night Brings Serious Results—Victim in Critical Condition.

THREE ARRESTED

Police Seeking Others in Gang of Russians—One Is Identified.

Three men are being held by police following a street brawl yesterday evening, in which Nahoon Lazervitch, 84 Philip street, was struck on the head and critically injured.

The men are Steve Rowak, 65 William street; Pete Gorman, 517 Philip street; and Harry Glonch, 517 Philip street, all Russians. They were arrested this morning by Inspector of Detectives Thomas Nickle and Detective George E. Walsh on nominal charges of disorderly conduct.

The prisoners were taken to Victoria hospital, where Lazervitch lies suffering from concussion. Although stupified to an extent from the head injury, he was able to identify one as the man who struck him.

The detectives returned to police station with the prisoners, and proceeded to round up others who figured in the fight. More arrests are expected. Police believe nine men took part in the brawl.

Nine Were Fighting.

Constables Ayres, Knight and Harpur responded to a call sent into police station shortly after 5 o'clock last night. Nine Russians were fighting on Philip street, and one had been injured, the informant stated.

A C. N. R. freight train at Waterloo street crossing blocked the police patrol and handicapped the officers in arriving on the scene in time to drive the patrol several blocks distant to Adelaide street before a clear route to Philip street could be taken.

Lazervitch was found lying in the doorway of his boarding house at 84 Philip street in a semi-conscious condition. He was immediately taken to Victoria hospital.

Refused Questions.

According to police, the man was injured in a drunken street brawl. When he was admitted to the hospital his breath smelt strongly of liquor. He refused to answer any questions at the time. This morning, when visited by detectives, he told of a certain "Tony" who would know all about the fight.

Little improvement is shown in his condition today, authorities at the hospital report. Lazervitch is suffering from a fractured skull and other minor cuts. He will not be out of danger for three days at least.

The cause of the fracas remains a mystery police state. No information could be obtained from residents of Philip street. Lazervitch himself is reluctant to tell anything concerning the fight.

TWO REVOLVER SHOTS MARK PARIS MAY DAY

Few Minor Incidents Only Occur—Meetings Draw Small Crowds.

Paris, May 2.—Only a few untoward incidents of minor importance marked May Day in Paris. A couple of revolver shots were fired in the streets, and a taxicab filled with reporters of L'Humanite, the Socialist organ, was stopped by the police and the men arrested. Later they were set free after a police magistrate had informed them they would be charged with carrying prohibited arms, namely three blackjacks.

Six meetings which were held in the suburbs attracted but small audiences owing to the inclement weather.

Reports from the provinces give the same story of calm. Everywhere there was a general cessation of work, especially among the miners.

BECK'S PHYSICIAN WILL NOT TRY NEW REMEDY



Dr. Thomas F. Futcher Declines To Experiment With Anaemia Powder.

AWAITING PROOFS

Fifth Blood Transfusion Will Be Given Sir Adam This Week.

Baltimore, Md., May 2.—The Gardner remedy for pernicious anaemia, a large sample bottle of which was sent to Sir Adam Beck from Paris, will not be given to the hydro knight under present conditions, his physician, Dr. Thomas F. Futcher, being averse to trying any experiments on Sir Adam. He feels that it would be a great mistake to risk a setback to the patient, when his condition has markedly improved as the result of four blood transfusions, the use of acids, arsenic and sun baths and special dieting.

"We have not analyzed the Gardner remedy, and don't intend to," declared Dr. Futcher.

"We are not going to make experiments. Awaits Proof of Cures."

"Before there is any chance of our using the Gardner remedy, we will have to be supplied with evidence that the cure has proved itself. We are asking Prof. Gardner whether it was tried on animals, what cures it has effected, and what medical bodies have passed upon it and vouched for its efficacy. Until the most complete data is forthcoming from Paris, we will go on as before."

Dr. Futcher said that a fifth blood transfusion would be given to Sir Adam next week, but that the day for it had not been selected. He could not say whether further transfusions would be given; no limit to them had been set. The case had been diagnosed in the first place as one of pernicious anaemia, but the patient was doing nicely and unless something unforeseen happened would return to Canada by the end of May. For hundreds of years scientists had been searching for a cure for pernicious anaemia, and many had been announced, but none had lived up to advance notices. He had not heard of the Gardner cure until this week.

Announced in Paris.

The Gardner cure was announced in Paris by the discoverer, an English chemist, when a friend of Sir Adam was in the French capital. Some of the remedy was secured by this friend, from the laboratory in Paris before the cure was put on the market. It was sent to Sir Adam at the Johns Hopkins hospital with a lot of information about it, and instructions in the development of the remedy supplied by Professor Gardner himself. It is said that the remedy is taken through the mouth.

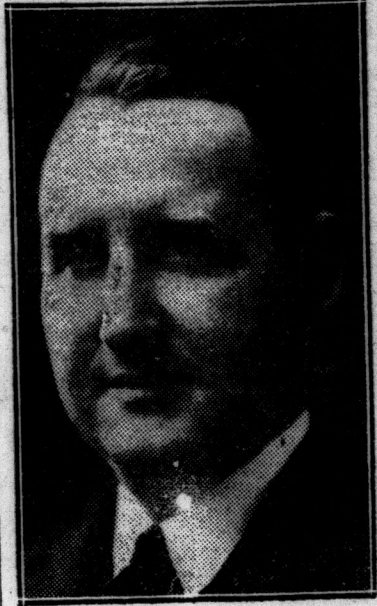
Hurst Park, England, May 1.—Creolian won the Victoria Cup handicap of £2,000 today.

CREW RESCUED OFF HALIFAX

Norwegian Freighter Moldegaard Goes Ashore During Dense Fog.

SOUGHT ALL NIGHT

Halifax, N. S., May 2.—The Norwegian freighter Moldegaard yesterday reported ashore in a dense fog somewhere near Halifax, has been located off Shute Island, east of the entrance to Halifax harbor, by the Canadian government steamer Stanley, which at 7 o'clock this morning had put out a lifeboat, which was engaged in rescuing the crew of the stranded ship.

After searching for the Norwegian craft all yesterday and last night the Stanley sighted her ashore on Shute Island shortly after 6 o'clock this morning.

Further advices from the Stanley received by C. H. Harvey of the marine and fisheries department, stated that all the Moldegaard's crew had been taken off the disabled ship with the exception of three men who are standing by the ship. The Stanley left the scene and is proceeding to Halifax with the Norwegian crew on board. Owing to the thick weather she will probably be late in arriving.

TORONTO THUGS GET \$700

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JUVENILE HOUDINI ESCAPES

Hinges at Children's Shelter Prove Easy, and Lad of 13 Slips to Freedom.

CITY SLUMBERS

Police Join in Search For Boy Adventurer—Made Good Time.

A young but practical edition of the great Houdini, exalted conqueror of jails and fetters, took advantage of a slumbering city last night and puzzled his way to freedom from the Children's shelter, on Wharncliffe road.

Shelter officials and local police have joined in a search for the 13-year-old adventurer. At noon, Houdini, Jun., was still at liberty.

Such antique accessories as hinges were easy for this lad. Brought to the shelter yesterday afternoon because his parents could not keep abreast of his many wanks, the lad's arrival excited little curiosity. His eyes were guileless and his whole demeanor mild. At bedtime he was taken to his own room and told to go to sleep.

Some time between dusk and dawn the boy d'Artagnon had slipped away. The door of his room was ajar this morning, but ajar at the side where the hinges should be performing their duty, because the pins had been neatly removed from the iron joints and laid upon the floor.

Averages show that boys who take French leave from shelter are invariably caught in a day or so. The searchers expect to have Houdini, Jun., returned to his playmates by Monday morning.

PLANE STILL SOARING AFTER 24-HOUR FLIGHT

Object of Trip Is To Prove Machine Capable of Long Flight This Summer.

Philadelphia, May 2.—With 24 hours of continuous flight recorded, the naval seaplane P. N. 9 was still sweeping up and down a forty mile course above the Delaware River today at 80 miles an hour. Early in the day a message dropped as the plane soared over the Philadelphia navy yard stating 240 gallons of gasoline were still in the tanks and that everything aboard was running smoothly.

The object of the non-stop flight is to demonstrate the capability of the great plane to make the long hop from the west coast to Honolulu this summer. The start was made yesterday at 10:22 a. m. with 1,300 gallons of gasoline, 150 gallons of oil and a crew of four.

PRINCESS YOLANDA GIVES BIRTH TO SON

EXCHANGE RATE ON FREIGHT TO BE 1-64TH OF 1 PER CENT

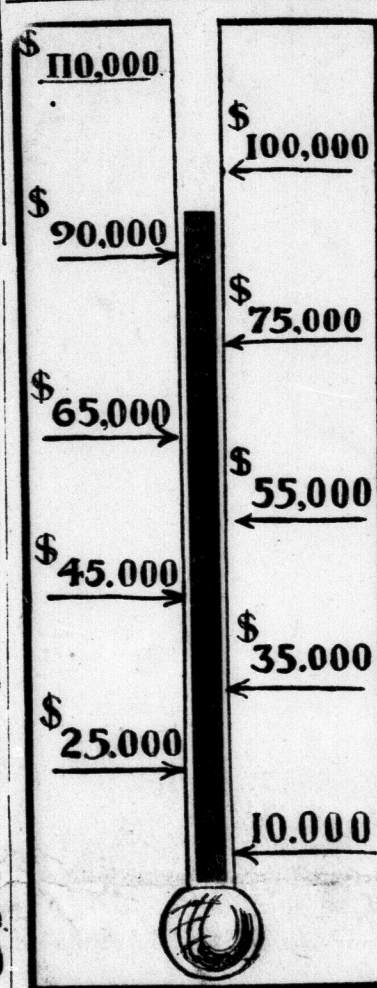

50,000 Families Move Same Day

Montreal Residents Lose Dwellings Through Lease System.

Montreal, May 1.—Between 40,000 and 50,000 families were engaged in moving today, owing to Montreal's yearly lease system. No strikes of importance are in progress in the city at present.

SUPREME COURT JUDGE TO BE SELECTED SOON

Four Toronto Men Prominently Mentioned For High Post.

Ottawa, May 1.—Appointment to the supreme court bench of the province of Ontario, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Justice MacLaren of the appellate division, is expected to be officially announced here shortly.

Among the names mentioned as possible appointees are James H. Spence, K.C., Toronto; D. Inglesbrant, K.C., Toronto; James Day, K.C., Toronto; C. W. Kerr, K.C., Toronto, and R. S. Robertson, K.C., Toronto.

It is possible that one of the present trial judges may be elevated to the appellate division, to replace the late Justice MacLaren, and that the new justice to be appointed may fill the vacancy caused by such promotion.

KING'S SISTER IS SEIZED WITH GASTRIC HEMORRHAGE

London, May 2.—The Princess Royal Louise, sister of King George, yesterday suffered a severe gastric hemorrhage, which was followed by considerable shock and weakness.

A medical bulletin this morning says that after a restless night, her highness regained some strength and there has been no recurrence of the incident. The Princess Royal, who was born February 20, 1867, is the widow of the Duke of Fife, who died in January 1912.

URGES NEW LINE.

Ottawa, May 1.—A resolution to provide for the construction and completion of a railway line from a point about five miles south of Regina to Avonlea, Sask., by the Canadian National Railway, prior to Aug. 31, 1927, was introduced in the house today by Hon. George P. Graham, minister of railways and canals.

REBELS ATTACK FRENCH

Moroccan Tribesmen Launch Drive Over Front of Sixty Miles.

MORE MEN SENT

Offensive of El Krim's Troops Aimed At the City of Fez.

Fez, Morocco, May 2.—Moroccan tribesmen, operating under the orders of Abd El Krim, the rebel leader, are attacking the French zone over front of 40 miles. At some points they have surrounded French posts where small detachments are defending themselves in blockhouses. The French military authorities here are of the opinion that the rebel leaders has a vast project in mind, with Fez as the principal objective.

The direction of the attacks thus far made by the tribes in their offensive indicates a plan for a converging movement upon this city.

Posts Well Provided.

There is no serious apprehension for the isolated posts which are provided with machine guns and three-inch pieces. With this equipment it is felt, the garrison should be able to keep the tribesmen at a distance. It will be necessary, however, to provision them with water within a short time.

The French forces in the zone of activity number about 12,000 men. Reinforcements now on the way will bring the total to 20,000.

Extension of native rebellions from the Spanish to the French zones in Morocco have been indicated recently. Wednesday S. I. Mohammed, younger brother and right-hand man of Abd El Krim, the Moroccan leader, was reported to have entered the French zone at the head of a considerable native force.

Sultan of the Tribe.

Abd El Krim, after years of fighting against the Spanish, succeeded early this year in causing Spain to withdraw her troops virtually to the coast line, leaving him practically the master of what had been the Spanish zone in Morocco. This left a portion of the French zone exposed, and natives began to filter across the line—peacefully, but nevertheless in a manner arousing French apprehension that the rebel movement, inspired by success against the Spanish, might be extended to the French area.

COMMERCIAL FAILURES.
