## WELLESLEY TOWNSHIP DEEPLY INTERESTED

IN CASE NOW BEFORE COURTS.

The arbitration decision recently given by His Honor Judge Chisholm re the police village of Wellesley did not please the Wellesley township council and they appealed the case to the High Court at Toronto on the grounds that Judge Chisholm should not have included the license money, dog taxes, etc., in his award. Their contention was upheld by the High Court last Monday and referred back to Judge Chisholm for readjustment.

The Wellesley Maple Leaf says that it was understood in the village that the trustees and council had agreed to accept the award of the Judge as final and there was some surprise when it was learned last week that the council, for if His Honor cannot call upon what they could appeal. It looks at present as if the village is now practically at the mercy of the council, for if His Honor cannot by law award any of the license and dog tax to the village, the council can withhold enough of this money to reduce the amount to about 31 per cent, no matter how high a sum His Honor grants the police village out of the other taxes. The trustees, expecting to receive the whole amount first awarded to the village, have gone on with improvements which will now be very difficult for them to finance if the council deals high handed in the matter. Judge Chisholm's amended award will be looked for with anxiety.

## MANY MINERS KILLED

Terrible Explosion of Gas in Russian Mine.

Hundred and Fifty-Seven Badly Burned Bodies Taken From Shaft at Yusovo — Seventy-Three Men Rescued Alive — Great Excitement in the Vicinity — Troops Have Been Called Out.

Yusovo, European Russia, July 3.—A terrible explosion of gas occurred in the Rokovsky mine Wednesday evening in which a large number of miners were at work. One hundred and fifty-seven bodies have been recovered, all of which are badly burned, but it is believed that the death toll will reach at least two hundred. Seventy-three of the men were rescued alive yesterday. There is great excitement here, and troops have been called out to prevent disorder.
