THE REASON

The Ocean Limited is row off the timetable of the I. C. R., much to the disappointment of the people in this district and the Maritime Provinces generally. The reason given out for the discontinuance of the train was that the train did not pay, and if this statement is genuine there are no business reasons for objecting. But is the statement truthful? It is a matter of record that for many months the Ocean Limited had been "silly behind time, running on many occasions as much as four hours late, and it was the exception not the rule for her to be on time passing through Campbellton.

It was openly stated by railway men and press, that the heavy traffic on the train, which originally intended for seven cars and as often running ten, eleven and twelve, was responsible for the late time. To the man in the street therefore, this does not look as if the train was not a paying one, and as the famous Halifax to St. John reduced rates are not in operation at our end of the line, there are very few who would not confidently state that the train did pay. What is the real reason for the change? Many think and a goodly number of railway employees will tell you that the I. C. R. is now only an adjunct of the C. P. R., and to make a rough guess that the Ocean Limited was interfering with the C. P. R. trains would not be far off the mark, and now instead of the People's railway being run for the benefit of the people is now merely used for political expediency. Meantime we have lost the train and it will be many weary months before it ever goes on again and even then it will only be by grace of the C. P. R.

LICENSING.

On another page we give a short report of a meeting of the Liquor License Commissioners which was held last Monday and adjourned till next Monday. We would respectfully point out to the Commissioners that from what we can gather that they are going beyond their powers, and that it would be better to make sure of their position before proceeding further. When the Commissioners met Tuesday, Jan. 27th and granted the licenses they finished their work and there was no thought of having an adjourned meeting. The work was finished and the meeting they held Monday was NOT an adjourned meeting, but in reality a new court and if any other licenses are now granted the work of the Com.

**PARCEL POST TO
START FEB. 10TH**

What it Will Cost to Send
Goods This Way in the
Maritime Provinces

In the maritime provinces the rates on a parcel sent up to 40 miles are: one pound, five cents; two pounds, six cents; three pounds, seven cents; four pounds, eight cents; five pounds, ten cents; six pounds, twelve cents; seven pounds, fourteen cents; eight pounds, sixteen cents; nine pounds, eighteen cents; ten pounds, twenty cents; eleven pounds, twenty-two cents.

Eleven pounds is the weight limit on all parcels within the maritime provinces, but beyond the twenty mile radius the rates are from one to eleven pounds as follows: 10c, 14c, 18c, 22c, 26c, 30c, 34c, 38c, 42c, 46c, 50c.

A parcel may be mailed from the Maritime Provinces to any office in Quebec at the following rates, running in order from one to eleven pounds: 10c, 16c, 22c, 28c, 34c, 40c, 46c, 52c, 58c, 64c, 70c.

The rates on a parcel mailed from the Maritime Provinces to any part of Ontario are 12c, 20c, 28c, 36c, 44c, 52c, 60c, 68c, 76c.

To Manitoba the rates for the Maritime Provinces are: 12c, 24c, 34c, 44c, 54c, 64c, 74c, 84c, 94c, \$1.04, \$1.14.

To any office in Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia the rates are: 12c, 24c, 36c, 48c, 60c, 72c, 84c, 96c, \$1.08, \$1.20, \$1.32.

The system will be inaugurated on February 10th.

**SAY THAT THE BISHOP
WAS HOODWINKED**

Accuse Him of Being an Ally
of the Government to Hide
Methods in Jail

London, Jan. 31.—The militant suffragettes are very angry with the Bishop of London, the Right Rev. Arthur Feleyn Winnington Ingram, over his report that there was no truth in the allegations of ex-cruelty torture being inflicted on their comrades who are subjected to forcible feeding in Holloway jail. They accuse the prelate of being an ally of the government, and Mrs. Dacre-Fox, one of the leaders of the Women's Social and Political Union, wrote to him to-day as follows:

"A whitewash brush has been placed in your hand, my lord bishop, by the authorities, in order that the public shall remain ignorant of the diabolical methods used by the government in its desire to terrorize the militant women."

The writer adds: "The whole truth of the matter is you have allowed the government and the prison officials to hoodwink you. We hold letters from Miss Peace, now an inmate of Holloway jail, describing the torture she has undergone. She has on two occasions to our knowledge broken down under the supreme suffering involved."

Aroused by the Bishop of London's letter, declaring that "there is no truth in the allegations that the suffragettes in Holloway jail are subjected to torture while being forcibly fed," suffragettes today repeatedly interrupted the consecration services conducted by him at St. Michael's church. The women sat up a chant, in which reference was made to forcible feeding, and they called upon the Bishop to put a stop to "the torture of women in English prisons."

The disturbances were quickly removed. An attempt made by the women to reach the Bishop as he left the church was frustrated by the police who were present in force in anticipation of trouble.
