BUFFALO LAWYER SHOT DOWN

MYSTERIOUSLY MURDERED WHILE

WALKING IN THE STREET. lets In His Head From an Unknown Hand-Died Ten Minutes After Being

Found-Probably Shot While Resisting BUFFALO, N.Y., April 28 .- Right in the heart of the city, on its most fashionable thoroughfare, a young, prosperous and well-known lawyer was shot and murdered to-night. At present there is no clue as to his assin. The deed was committed at the corner of Bryant-street and Delaware-

avenue, at a quarter to 10. Residents of the avenue heard the shots and ran to find Monte avenue heard the shots and ran to find Monts gomery Gibbs weltering in his life-blood, and no one else in sight.

A passing ambulance was hailed and the dying man instantly removed to the general hospital, but he died on his arrival without being able to give any intimation of the cause of assault or the name of his assailant.

Mr. Gibbs was about 35 years old and unmarried. He was formerly as newspapes man, having begun his career on The Telegraph and finished it on The Republic. He afterwards adopted the profession of law and had been practising about five years. He had a brother, Clinton B. Gibbs, also a law yer, in Buffalo, and another, Watter, a real estate dealer in New York.

He was popular and well liked and as far as known had not an enemy in the world. The theory of suicide is regarded as antendable, as no revolver was found near the stricken man.

The hospital surgeons say he was shot twice, once in the nose and once in the temple, both shots being at short range. The neighbors say they heard three shots. The police are mystified and are using every effort to discover some fact throwing light on the mystery; the theory is that Mr. Gibbs was accosted by a footpad and shot while resisting robbery.

A Woman in the Case.

The police confess they have not a single clue. They are completely baffled. The most generally accepted theory is that there is a woman at the bottom of the affair. It is asserted positively that Gibbs was concerned in more than one liaison, especially with young married women, and one of his Niagara Falls' victims is said to have been in Buffalo Saturday, though no one asserte positively that this fact may be taken in connection with his killing.
