During the few days immediately pre ceding the battle of St. Eustache, Che nier had to contend with many difficulties. A number of his men, being anable to secure arms, rejuined to their homes, and many followed the advice of the cure of the parish, Abbe Paquin, and his vicar, who told them THE RATHBUN CO'Y. that resistance to the troops would be disastrous. The Chenier statue is a fire piece of work, from the shops of 1 W. H. Mullins, Salem, Ohio. It is not a cast, but is made of embosed copper, on the same principle as the Statue of Liberty in New York. The delicate and artistic work was performed by Mr. Paul Bert. Chenier is in the attiude of a captain leading the attack. Stepping forward, he points to the enemy with his right hand, while his left grasps a long, old-fashioned muskets. His costume is that of the country gentry of the time, a long coat, with 'capu-chon," knickerbockers, and buckled shoes. He also wears the traditional French-Canadian sash, in the folds of which is concealed a huge horse pistol, and a powder hogy horize of his side.


