As a swing of the pendulum of fashion in the opposite direction no feature of the modes can more clearly exemplify the vagaries than the plaited dresses that are invading the realm of dress. But one thing must be remembered. Fullness there is in all the new frocks, but balloon skirts are not the type to which we have resorted. There is still the straight line of the figure to be adhered to, and it must be admitted that the designers have given fullness in the plaiting without bulkiness, flowing lines without ugliness and a change without the usual shock. One meets the pannier gown everywhere. Pictured is a new model showing a modified pannier drapery that is very graceful. The material used is green and white "candy striped" taffeta, with trimming bands and petticoat of black taffeta.

A wide frill at the neck is echoed by narrow frills in the sleeves. Black satin boots with crystal buttons accompany the frock.

**Useful Tips to the Jelly Maker.**  
 Use good fruit which is a little under-ripe.  
 Use the best granulated sugar.  
 Do not make large quantities of jelly at one cooking.  
 Heat the sugar in the oven before adding it to the fruit juice.  
 If the juice must be boiled down always do so before the sugar is added.  
 The jelly will be clearer and finer if the fruit is simmered gently and not stirred during cooking.  
 Do not allow the sirup to boil rapidly or crystals may appear in the jelly.  
 Always make jelly on a bright, clear day.  
 Wash the jelly glasses in hot water and set them on a folded cloth wrung out of hot water.  
 Set the jelly in a sunny window for twenty-four hours, then cover with melted paraffin and set in a dry, cool place.

**Campers' Shortcake.**  
 One pint of flour, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, a little salt, a spoonful of sugar. Mix with water or milk so the batter will drop, not "run," from the spoon. Pour into a hot pan well greased. Now cover and bake ten minutes. Have ready another pan with a little lard and when hot turn the cake into the pan and bake twenty minutes. Good with canned peaches or berries.

**TOMATO RECIPES.**

**Unusual and Dainty Ways of Serving This Delicious Vegetable.**

Tomatoes at this season of the year are at their very best and cheapest, and as they are a favorite vegetable in every family it behooves the housewife to find out new ways of serving them. Here are some attractive recipes that are little known:

**Tomatoes au Gratin.**—Skin half a dozen ripe tomatoes and then place a layer of them in the bottom of a baking dish, cover with a layer of buttered and slightly toasted breadcrumbs, seasoned with salt and pepper, then more tomatoes and crumbs until the dish is full, with the crumbs on top. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and bake in moderately hot oven for an hour. A little onion juice and minced parsley may be used.

**Tomato Frappe.**—Take large round ripe tomatoes and after peeling them take out the inside and rub through a coarse sieve to take out the seeds. Season the pulp well with salt, pepper, cayenne, celery salt, a little mustard and enough vinegar and sugar to make it pleasantly subacid. Add a little onion juice or minced garlic and then freeze the whole until quite solid. Let it stand repacked until ready to serve and then fill the hollowed out tomatoes, cover with mayonnaise jelly, placing a crisp leaf of lettuce under each tomato, and serve at once. This is very cool and refreshing when served on a hot day.

**Boiled Tomatoes, Devil'd Sauce.**—Wipe the tomatoes clean, cut off, then slice from the blossom and stem end of each and cut in halves. Season with salt, pepper and cayenne and dip into fine dry breadcrumbs, then place into beaten egg and again in breadcrumbs. Place in a fine wire broiler and broil both sides a nice brown and serve with sauce as soon as done.

**Devil'd Sauce.**—Cream four tablespoonfuls of butter with two tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar, one teaspoonful of dry mustard, quarter teaspoonful of salt, dash of cayenne, yolk of one hard boiled egg rubbed smooth, one egg lightly beaten and quarter of a cupful of vinegar. Cook in double boiler until it thickens to the consistency of thick cream. Serve hot or cold.

**RULES FOR SAVING.**

**What a German Housewife Says About Cost of Living.**  
 The German housewife spends very little of her time worrying over the high cost of living, according to Mrs. Anna Kirchstein, a member of one of the German women's clubs of Chicago. "The German housewife," she says, "adjusts her expenditures to her income. If she has less money she uses less in her home and contents herself." Mrs. Kirchstein's rules for economy in the home are:  
 Pay cash for everything.  
 Do your own buying and marketing.  
 Be careful in your selection of food.  
 Study out at the beginning of the week just how much you can spend that week.  
 Manage your own household, leaving nothing to the servants.  
 Figure out a system of utilizing all materials. Even the leftovers from a meal can be made into something the next day.  
 Do not regard this system of economy as a burden, but as a pleasure and the duty of a wife to her husband.
