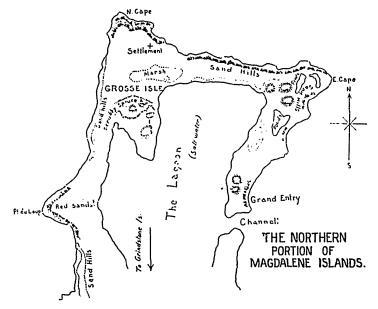

After watching behind a sandhill for some time I located the position of it, and going quickly to the spot where she disappeared, was rewarded for my patience by seeing her flutter along the grass as though wounded. I soon found the nest, placed among short grass in a dry part of the salt marsh; it was lined with a little withered grass. Only a few of of these birds now appear to breed among the Magdalens, in all probability a few years ago they were common. Proceeding eastward we drove among the sandhills, which are interspersed with boggy pools and fresh water ponds, where quantities of the large American cranberry grow. There is also here
