ADDRESS IN MEDICINE.*

Mr. President and Gentlemen:—

The parable of the unjust judge who finally yielded to the importunities of the litigious widow finds its parallel in the present instance.

Some time in September of last year, on the occasion of the meeting of the Canadian Medical Association in Ottawa, I met the genial president of the Maritime Medical Association, and in an unguarded moment allowed him to sound me on the question of delivering the Address in Medicine at the meeting of the Maritime Medical Association and the Medical Society of Nova Scotia, in the following July. There seemed to be plenty of time to consider the matter, and I gave I fear an evasive answer, trusting in my innermost soul that time would obliterate on both sides the recollection of this interview.
