DESTITUTION IN THE WESTERN ISLANDS .- Our islanders are not quite so noisy as their destitute brethren across the channel; but from the accounts which have found their way into the newspapers, they do not seem to stand in less need of electrosynary aid. The Inverness Courier says :- " It is high time that something effective should be done in the Hebrides. A population of fully 50,000 is literally bordering on starvation. The number of deaths from dysentery and cholera is increasing with fearful rapidity among the cottar class, and the small crofters are fast exhausting their little stores of corn. Most of them, we are assured, now restrict themselves to one scanty meal in the day, and the children and aged persons continue the greater part of the time in their miserable beds, for the sake of warmth, and that they may require less food.22 The government have not been altogether unmindful of the wants of these poor people, vessels having been sent to Mull, Skye, and other islands, with stores of provisions. The members of the free church have also made praiseworthy exertions to send relief into the most destitute quarters. We fear, however, that there is still a great deal of want present a large field for the exercise of judicious benevolence. - Glasgow Citizen.

SUBSTITUTE FOR DETONATING GUN CAPSULES. -The manufacture of the fulminate preputations is one of the most dangerous for the health of the anaker. M. Pelouze, of Paris, has solved, it seems, this great desideratum. If you compress in any of the usual copper gun capsules a small quantity of explosive cotton or paper, with a few grains of gunpowder, it will perfectly serve for infiming the powder in the barrel; the effects of this new combination are, in fact, quite identical with those of fuiminate of mercury. M. Pelouze thinks that other substances than the few grains of guapowder may be used, nutit answers all necessary purposes.

TUSNELING THE ALES. The Moniteur Belge announces that experiments have been made within the last few days, in order to test, the efficacy of a machine just invented for the outpose of effecting a new and speedy method of boring tunnels. It is proposed to apply this machine to the construction of the great tunnel about to be commenced for one of the Italian lines. The machine was placed in front of the web, and effected a hore to the depth of 18 centimetres in 35 minutes. At this rate the new invention will complete upwards of five metres of hore per day, and the proposed tunnel through Mount Conis will be finished in the space of three years. The experiments have been repeated twice before several of the first engineers of France, and with complete success.

THE Committee, feeling deeply the increasing amount of destitution which each post announces, would again appeal to public benevolence, and submit a brief statement of their proceedings up to the present date.

A schooner laden with meal, for the supply of Westport and that extensive district, has reached its destination. The expense of this cargo, exclusive of freight, amounts to £512 10s. 6d

A second schooner was despatched last week to Killibegs, with a cargo of meal, whence portions of it will be conveyed by revenue cruisers to the most lestitute districts of the Counties of Donegal and Mayo, with the valuable aid and co-operation of the Coas' Guard, whose services at the present moment cannot be too highly appreciated. The expeuse of this cargo, exclusive of freight, amounts to £1,196 Ss. These cargoes are to be sold at a rate somewhat under first cost, except in peculiar cases, where it may be necessary that gratuitous aid should be afforded.

Neveral grants for the purchase of provisions amounting to £1,567 5s. 61. have been made, chiefly to relief committees in inland districts. where the local resources cannot meet the destitution.

Upwards of £200 has been expended in boilers of a large description, with a view of promoting the stablishment of Soup Kitchens, and the Committee have received many gratifying communications from various quarters which encourage them to proceed with increased energy in this department of their labours, more especially as they are convinced that under existing difficulties, soup must necessarily constitute a material part of the relief to be afforded.

The amount of funds which have as yet been placed at their disposal is £5,278 15s. When, however, they compare this sum with the numerous and increasing claims for relief which daily come under their notice, they are tempted to exclaim, "What are these among so many?" hut they entertain a hope that the words of Him who once said, in reference to the famishing multitude, " Give ye them to eat," will find a ready response, and that the Lord will open the hearts of many, and constrain them to minister to the necessities of their destitute and famishing fellow creatures.

A few extracts from the hundreds of letters received by the Committee from persons of known respectability, will suffice to prove that a painful His usual assortment of Liquors and Groceries

dren, who two months ago were in health and spirits, now reduced to living skeletons, pining to death."

"On behalf of the starving hundreds around me, I plead not want; no, gentlemen, I plead starra-tion—a plea that involves life or death. Many have died, many more are dying, and unless immediate relief be procured, what must inevitably be the result? Dysentery has for some time prevailed, and I regret to say that typhus fever is making ra-

"There is uniformity of wretchedness in the parishes along the sea coast. On the list of absolutely destitute persons I have at this moment 1,320, and to meet this mass of want, there is only employment given to seventy-five men upon the public works."

"Thirty deaths in this week!!!- Fever Hospital over-flowing-many of these died on coming into hospital after getting food—one poor fellow dropped sociation in the hall."

The committee entered upon the arduous work in which they are now engaged from an earnest desire to do what they could, with the Divine blessing, to alleviate and check, if possible, the progress of a calamity which bailes all description. Their object is simply, to be instrumental in carrying out at this trying moment, an extensive and impartial plan of benevolence throughout Ireland, and they humbly trust that funds adequate to the occasion will not he wanting, to enable them to fulfil the trust they have undertaken.

It is the intention of the Committee to charter a steamer with the provisions as soon as practicable, and arrangements are at present in progress having that object in view.
