INFLATION—POLICY RESPECTING POSSIBLE USE OF WAGE AND PRICE CONTROLS

Hon. Robert L. Stanfield (Leader of the Opposition): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Prime Minister. Was the Minister of State from Calgary South expressing government policy when he said outside the House on June 11 that, while the government had contingency plans for dealing with the expected increase in inflationary pressures, price and wage controls were not part of those plans because he did not think they would work? Was the minister expressing government policy when he indicated that price and wage controls were not part of the contingency planning of the government with regard to the control of inflation?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, I would have to check exactly what was said by the minister, but to the extent he has been quoted correctly by

the Leader of the Opposition it is not government policy. There are contingency plans and these are part of them.

INFLATION—TERMINATION OF PRICES AND INCOMES COMMISSION—CONTINGENCY PLANNING BY CONTINUING GROUP

Mr. Stanfield: Has the government authorized the continuance of a contingency planning group, perhaps a remnant of the Prices and Incomes Commission or, in any event, a continuing planning group, to carry on research on the role of a prices and incomes policy with regard to inflation, and is the planning of such a prices and incomes control policy within the terms of reference of that group?

Mr. Trudeau: With regard to the first part of the question, Mr. Speaker, yes. I recall answering a similar question in the House several weeks ago. I said then that after the Prices and Incomes Commission had reached the end of its mandate there would be kept in the government a small group of people who would be dealing with the problem on a continuing basis. One of the aspects, I am sure, of their work will be to keep various contingency plans updated in the event that the government might want to use them.

Mr. Stanfield: Is a contingency plan for wage and price controls specifically within the terms of reference of that group? Can the Prime Minister also tell the House to what minister that group will be reporting and to what minister the government will be looking for recommendations with regard to anti-inflationary measures and the development of contingency plans?

Mr. Trudeau: With regard to the first part of the question, Mr. Speaker, the terms of reference are generally as I stated them in my first answer. With regard to the second part of the question, the Prices and Incomes Commission will continue reporting to the same minister, at present the Minister of State for Urban Affairs, until such time as it finishes its work. The small working group which will be kept on will be an assignment of some minister whom I have not yet determined.
