Believes Glutted Conditions of European Markets Will Bar Imports.

CHICAGO, Oct. 17 .- Huge stocks of wheat in Europe, leaving no apparent outlet for Canadian shipments unless the marketing be done this side of the border, kept prices today on the down-grade. After an unusually active ses-sion, and violent fluctuations, the close sion, and violent fluctuations, the close was nervous, 3-8 to 5-8c net lower. Corn was down 1-2 to 5-8c, oats 1-8 to 1-4c, and provisions 2 1-2 to 7 1-2c. Foreign, ports were said to be so glutted that storage room for wheat had become exhausted, quotations sharply depressed, and importers chary about making any purchases whatever. Traders here could scarcely get their bearings this morning before being confronted by the fact that the market had again broken the low price record for this year's crop. Pessimists meanwhile were busy declaring that the radically bearish action of Liverpool, which had to a great extent been pool, which had to a great extent been the cause of the latest break here, left no alternative but for the Canadian crop to be headed toward the United

Referring to the acreage in the United States sown in winter wheat, The Modern Miller says:

In parts of Kansas some delay caused by difficulty in procuring seed wheat, but fine seed was sent to these sections and work now being rushed.
