FORMAN SAYS WANLESS PROPERTY ON YONGE ST. IS OVER-ASSESSED

Assessment Commissioner Makes This Claim in Letter Read by Alderman to Council Members—Property Rated According to Purposes for Which It May Be Used.

Regarding reports published in the World recently respecting his assessment in North Toronto, Ald. Wm. Forman yesterday, in a letter published below, submitted the letter published below. The report of "a paper" on this question was untrue, he stated. The letter reads: "May 11, 1914. 'Dear Sir,—I have your communication of the 11th inst. in which you desire answers to certain questions regarding the assessment of your property on Yonge street, at the southwest corner of Eglinton avenue. 'I may say that the property described as lot No. 114, plan 1187, having a frontage on Yonge street of 119 feet 6 inches by a depth on Eglinton avenue of 136 feet 6 inches, for the year 1914, is assessed at the rate of \$90 per foot, or a total of \$10,755. 'The property adjoining on the south is assessed at \$75 per foot. The northwest corner is assessed as having a frontage of 50 feet, on Yonge street and 150 feet on Eglinton avenue, and it is rated at \$100 per foot, or a total of \$5,000. The property to the north, ranging in depth from 155 feet to 176 feet, is assessed at \$85 per foot. 'Before leaving this corner I beg to say that, according to the assessment roll, your property is slightly over-assessed, that is, the assessor has taken the whole 119 feet 6 inches at \$90 per foot as the corner price, while the northwest corner 50 feet is taken at \$100 per foot. If we apply the same principle to the southwest corner we find that, taking your land at 50 feet at \$100 per foot and the adjoining 69 feet 6 inches at \$75 per foot, we have a total assessment of \$10,212, as against the actual assessment of \$10,755, and this is after allowing the difference in the depths between the two corners, your corner being 136 feet 6 inches in depth, against the northwest corner being 150 feet in depth. 'Answering the questions in the order as you put them: '1. Neither you, nor anyone for you, approached me at any one of my subdivisions at any time, directly or indirectly, in an endeavor to secure a low rate for assessment purposes on this property. '2. Never at any time did you bring pressure to bear, directly or indirectly, upon me or anyone in my department, to secure a reduction, or any favors whatsoever. '3. Never at any time was I, nor any one of my staff, governed by your aldermanic position with respect to this assessment. 'How They Do It. 'Your question as to whether the department is required to estimate the value of such property on the basis of its value for commercial use or on its anticipated sentimental value, I beg to say "Your property is rated by the assessor at its value

HAND HARD JOLT TO WINTER SHOW

National Exhibition Directors Advise City Not to Furnish Grant.

MISSION IS FUTILE Government Now Perfecting Plans for Exhibit Which Deserves Support.

No matter what the mission of the Toronto Winter Fair Stock Show is, it is futile and worse still, is harmful to the fat stock show at Guelph, or the National Exhibition here, and the city should not spend its money attempting to build up a show, which could only be a success in so far as it detracts from either the present winter show at Guelph or the great exhibition held under the auspices of the Canadian Exhibition. 'This was the import of a statement issued yesterday after the National Exhibition directors had met. The statement also says: "Apart altogether from the unquestioned right of the Canadian National Exhibition, under its lease of the site, to hold a similar exhibition on the grounds, the board of directors was unanimous in the opinion that the holding of a show such as proposed in November, is not in the interests of the Canadian National Exhibition, nor is it called for by the necessary agricultural interests of the country. If the show is to be run as a fat stock and stallion show, with educational features, it merely parallels the work already being done at Guelph, and the city should therefore not attempt to duplicate the work already being done by that exhibition. 'In conclusion, the board recommends that no show be held paralleling Guelph Exhibition, and that no large live stock, horticultural and dairy show be attempted until such time as the Dominion Government, which is now working up a plan of a great national show, completes its plans. That when these plans are completed, the city should then place at the disposal of the government these grounds, and support liberally the carrying out of a national project of that kind. 'Of the statement Mayor Hooker last night expressed the opinion that the Dominion Government would do little toward making Toronto the site of the winter show in the east until the city had done something to demonstrate its desire to secure the show.

WANTS ACTION ON RAILWAY PURCHASE

Controller Church Gives Notices of Motion Respecting Transportation Matters.

Controller Church yesterday gave notice of motion for a bylaw to purchase the street railway, and followed it with one for civic car lines. 'The first read: "That the purchase of the Toronto Street Railway and Toronto Electric Light Co. be submitted to the people on Jan. 1 next. 'That G. R. Geary, K.C., be instructed to lay on the table of council forthwith, on the present exact position of affairs, and causes of delay, the preparation of said agreement, and also reasons for not having carried out instructions of council on the subject, as the mayor announced in his inaugural address that the agreement had been prepared. 'The second read: "That notwithstanding the purchase agreement, a bylaw for civic car lines be submitted to the people on Jan. 1 next, and that a report on the state thereof be submitted by June 15, and the proper bylaw be prepared and introduced in council by Sept. 1; the line in North Toronto from C. P. R. tracks through Mount Pleasant; also line west from Yonge street, extension of Danforth and Gerrard street lines eastward and linking up with Beaches; Lansdowne extension to St. Clair avenue; Christie street extension to C. P. R.; West End and Sunnyside line; West Bloor street extension; Bell Line, Bloor, Jane, Pacific and Annette and extension St. Clair line into ward seven; North Rosedale and Moore Park line."

GOT BEST BOND PRICE IN SEVERAL MONTHS

City Accepts Offer of 97.40 for Half-Million Issue.

An offer of 97.40 for \$500,000 worth ten-year 4 1/2 per cent. local improvement debentures was yesterday accepted by the board of control from an insurance concern in New York. This represents a yield of 4 1/2 per cent., a somewhat better figure than the city has secured for some time. The value of the sale is in sounding the American market, since \$2,500,000 bonds of the same character are being prepared for sale by tender. 'Wireless Telegraphy Easier by Night. (Special Correspondence.) NEWCASTLE, N. NO INCREASE YET IN WATER RATES

Council Decided to Get More Information Before Acting.

MCBRIDE SETTLED IT

His Vote Was the Deciding One When the Question Was "Put."

The mayor, Controller McCarthy and others of the council who advocated immediate passing of the water rate increase gave way to Ald. F. S. Spence, measure and party when the increases became an issue at last night's meeting, and acceded to repeated demands for "more information." The details for "more information" were asked for will delay passing of the bill two weeks at least, and, according to the administration, haste is imperative in order that the deficit of years' standing may be overcome. Information to be given will include a comparison of present and proposed charges, already published by the newspapers, and a table of charges in other cities. 'Sliphed Methods. Assurance that the proposed rates were not likely to be reduced when they were passed was given by Controller McCarthy. From his statements it seems that so sliphed have books that at the present time it was most difficult to tell what the water was costing. He did not know who the proposed rates were the right ones, but he believed, and overruled the doubt of \$238,000 within three years. Controller McCarthy did not hesitate to say that the department was run in an unbusiness-like manner, but he would not answer for blunders in former years. In debate water was more apparent how much the administration was forced to guess at the actual cost, because of scant information. But they took the ground that immediate increase revenue being necessary, the increases were justified. 'The mayor stated that under present rates the city will lose \$400,000 this year. He took it as a fundamental fact of public ownership, that a utility must pay its own way. If increase was not made at once, no more could be realized from the last half of the year than from the first;

What Council Did

Delayed the water rate increase, pending further information. Provided a site in the north end of High Park for a forest school for public school children. Granted \$10,000 to entertain the Ad Club in convention here in June. Carried Ryerson avenue widening. Passed upon laying one mile of pavement on Lake Shore road. Passed Strachan avenue bridges plans and consolidated local improvement bylaw, approved street opening at East Roxborough street and Highland road. and this was not enough. Haste was needed. 'No Account of Cost. Ald. Wickham proposed immediate passage of the bill, stated that at present there was no account of the cost of the system. He stated that the waterworks was capitalized at six or seven millions; now it was almost 20 million dollars the books showed. He thought the board was making these recommendations in the dark. Ald. Singer, too, thought Mr. McCarthy was guessing. When a vote was taken the division was 11 to 11, Chairman McBride cast the deciding vote and the bill was passed. 'At the evening session the issue assumed a more personal aspect with Controller McCarthy and Ald. F. S. Spence as principals. The former declared the holding up of the bill to be "petty obstruction." Ald. Spence would not deign to answer to this "and other derogatory terms." Again, the controller singled Mr. Spence out as one who was obstructing. More personalities were cut short by a motion to consider the bill being lost.

WANTS ALL LETTERS ON HYDRO RATES

Controller Simpson Anxious to Have Information Respecting Reduction Order.

The city council may now also take a hand in the hydro rate reduction matter. Yesterday Controller Simpson reported the local Hydro-Electric Commission make a return to this council of all the correspondence passed between them and the Provincial Hydro-Electric Commission respecting the reduction in electric lighting and power rates, with a view of informing members of council of the facts of the case. 'This motion carried. He also asked the city treasurer to report the number of appointments made by the provincial government, by the Corporation of Toronto, also giving salaries paid to said appointees.
