CHEERS FOR MEN WHO ARE LEAVING

Final Parade of Highlanders With Their Overseas Comrades.

RECRUITING GOES FINE

Col. Logie Pleased With Progress Already Made in Toronto.

An exceptionally fine parade was held by the 48th Highlanders at the armories last night. Including the guards and the overseas men, the parade numbered 872. A route march was held, headed by the brass band, followed by the overseas men in their uniforms, and the 48th Battalion in their dress uniforms.

Quota is Raised. Colonel Logie announced that as the 48th would not parade as a battalion again until Aug. 15, it would be their last parade with the overseas men before they left for the Niagara camp.

Col. Cowan stated last night that the Canadian Army Service Corps, which received a wire from headquarters yesterday asking the corps to hold its men in readiness so as to be prepared if this morning.

NEW KIND OF SHELL U. S. Company Professed to Sell Machinery for Inhumane Weapon.

LONDON, July 16.—(5 p.m.) The British Government today officially repudiated connection with an advertisement which appeared in The American Machinist, May 6, concerning a new kind of high explosive shell, described as capable of causing wounds which result in death in terrible agony within four hours, if not treated by an immediate operation.

THE HAGUE, July 16.—The Dutch Parliament today took decisive action in support of a program for a larger navy. The second chamber passed the bill authorizing the construction of two 7000-ton cruisers and four 800-ton submarines, and appropriating \$11,200,000 for that purpose.

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MORE MEN LANDED AT DARDANELLES

British Reinforcements Set Feet on Northern Shores of Gallipoli Peninsula.

TURK MORALE SHAKEN

Losses in Past Six Days Estimated at Twenty-Five Thousand Men.

MITYLENE, via Athens, July 16.—British reinforcements are reported to have been landed upon the northern shores of the Gallipoli Peninsula and are now within three hours' march of the town of Gallipoli, at the entrance of the Straits of Dardanelles.

Turkish losses in the past six days' fighting at the Dardanelles are estimated at 25,000 men, the Anglo-French fleet has been subjected to a most terrific bombardment by the land batteries of the allies have been advanced.

Prisoners state that the morale of the Turkish army has been shaken by the bombardment of the allies.

AUSTRIA'S CHOLERA EPIDEMIC. ZURICH, Switzerland, July 16, via London, 3:27 p.m.—The Austrian ministry of the interior today announced that there were 20 cases of Asiatic cholera in the empire on July 15, as compared with 77 cases on July 14. The alarming spread of the disease occurred chiefly in Galicia, where many prisoners of war are affected.

FURTHER TO PURSUE CRIMINAL COURSE

Paris Press Sees Germany's Accomplish Coming to Rescue.

MAY TERRORIZE U. S.

Austrian Note to Washington on Export of Arms Condemned.

PARIS, July 16.—5 p.m.—"Germany is too deeply involved and too thoroughly unmasked, so her accomplices comes to the rescue," says The Temps in a column editorial on the Austro-Hungarian note to the U. S.

The afternoon newspapers generally comment on the note, considering it a subtle attempt of the Austro-Germans to shift the basis of discussion between Austria, Germany and the U.S. from "Germany's act of piracy to a question of neutrality are interpreted in their opposite senses according to the immediate interest of who consider themselves right and wrong."

La Liberté asks editorially: "Will Americans let themselves be terrorized by the Austro-Germans?"

The note neither is a bluff or a warning, nor is it a threat, it is a challenge, still further in their criminal course of attacks on the persons and the property of the United States."

The newspaper considers the note "particularly laughable, Austria's ports being blocked not only by the Anglo-French, but also by Italy," and adds:
