Amalgam is probably still more used than any other one material to repair lost tooth tissue, and consequently its manipulation and use are of the greatest importance. Dr. Harper believes the lesson will be made profitable. There will be no names recorded or published, so that there is no reason to hesitate because of possible results. Dr. Harper's paper and the clinics in connection therewith will be most instructive, as the essayist is an authority upon the subject.
