## THE GLOBE AND BEANS.

Respecting "The Globe and Beans," and the quotation from The Right Honourable William Lyon Mackenzie King, which appeared in our issue of the 11th instant, the following facts should not be lost sight of:

Canadian Trade in Beans.  
Import from all countries  
Year Bus. Value Bus. Value  
1907 10,642 \$20,457 310,413 \$418,161  
1910 17,226 17,591 17,429 32,653

Comparison of imports into Canada of beans from all countries shows an increase of 66,583 bushels, while exports from Canada decreased 292,987 bushels. Conclusion: It would appear from the trade returns that Canada is now consuming more beans than she produces.

Canadian Trade in Beans with United States.  
1901-Value of imports from the United States, \$12,102.  
1910-Value of imports from the United States, \$73,637.  
Increase in importations from the United States, \$61,535.

Canadian Trade in Beans with Japan.  
1901-The quantity imported into Canada from Japan was 131 bushels, valued at \$387.  
1911-The quantity imported into Canada from Japan was 990 bushels, valued at \$12,326.  
Exports to Japan, none.

On the 17th of July, 1911, Canada entered into a treaty with Japan, under which Japanese products on importation into Canada will be entitled to favored nation treatment; therefore if the reciprocity agreement goes into effect, beans from Japan will be entitled to free entry. The same treatment as granted to United States and Japan will also be granted to Great Britain, Australia, British East Indies, British West Indies, Hong Kong, Newfoundland, Austria-Hungary and Switzerland. In 1910 beans were imported into Canada from each of these countries.

In 1910 the value of the importations of beans into Great Britain amounted to nearly \$2,500,000. Amongst the countries that exported beans to Great Britain will be found British India, New Zealand, Austria-Hungary, Russia, etc., all of which are entitled to favored nation treatment from Canada. In 1906 Canada exported to Great Britain beans valued at \$49,826. In 1910 her exports of beans to Great Britain only amounted to \$205. In 1906 United States shipped to Great Britain beans valued at \$45,585, while in 1909 the value of her exports of beans to Great Britain amounted to \$2,726.

The home market is the best friend of the Canadian bean grower. Under reciprocity it would be thenceforth open to all favored nations without compensating advantages.

## WHO INVENTED AND DEVELOPED BOURASSA.

According to The Globe it is a crime for one political party to take advantage of discussion within the ranks of its rival. The Conservatives are being lectured by The Globe for offering encouragement to Bourassa, Lavergne and the Nationalists in Quebec. The Globe says they are guilty of treason and they are in a game of treason and are doing their best to create a French-Canadian party, which, if it succeeds, will be effective not only for political mischief, but will prove of the greatest national peril.

Mr. Bourassa, Mr. Lavergne and their followers, who call themselves Nationalists, have all raised in the Liberal camp. Mr. Bourassa and Mr. Lavergne were two young men especially trained and developed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Politically they are nearer to him than almost anybody else in the Province of Quebec; and if they have parted from him and started a new movement of their own, and a movement against Sir Wilfrid, that is their affair. Mr. Monk, who is a Conservative, has identified himself with them and for that identification Mr. Monk is well able to assume responsibility.

What the public should appreciate and what the public will see in this situation is that the Nationalist movement in the Province of Quebec is an outgrowth of Liberalism and of Laurierism and it is responsibility for their actions must be placed on anybody, that responsibility must be laid at the door of the Liberal party.

## INFANT MORTALITY.

Dr. Helen MacMurchy has written a paper to show that being a baby is the most hazardous of all occupations. The reason is that most fathers and mothers do not know how to treat their infants. The mortality for babies in Toronto is 153 per 1000 births, in Ontario 124 per 1000; in London, England, it is only 109 per 1000. We should have at least as good a rate as London.

There will be no excuse for us until we have a very much better. In fact, the death rate for babies ought to be lower than that for adults. Young fathers and mothers ought to take pains to learn the few necessary things which babies need to keep them living and well.

## NOW COMES HOME RULE.

Now that the house of lords has been deprived of its power to block absolutely legislation to which it is opposed, the next great political struggle in the United Kingdom will be that over Irish local government. Already the parties are lining up for the campaign of education for and against home rule and it promises to be even fiercer than that against the peers. The latter was largely a parliamentary affair, for although the rank and file on both sides stood staunchly by their leaders, the incidents of the battles at Westminster were watched by the general public with curiosity rather than temper. But the home rule agitation is of a different color and will be fought out on the platform far more than on the floor of the house of commons.

It involves racial and religious sympathies and prejudices as well as political bias, and to all appearance the former will be played to the full in order to prevent fulfillment of the pledge given by the Liberal government to the Nationalist allies.

The earlier stages of the new home rule controversy will largely concern conjectural issues. Nothing is known of the plan of the government. If one has been approved, and Mr. Asquith curiously refused to disclose his intentions during the debate on the amendments to the veto bill. He had earlier, however, made it plain that the supremacy of the imperial parliament must not be impaired and that this must be real, effective and continuous. Mr. Redmond not only took no exception to this basic principle, but approved it, nor did he dissent from the view that the form of self-government accorded to Ireland should be equally applicable to the other nationalities included in the United Kingdom. In this connection it cannot be overlooked that a genuine revolution has occurred in the special condition of Ireland since Mr. Gladstone framed his home rule proposals. Vast obligations have been undertaken by the imperial government in connection with the transfer of farm lands and with national insurance which no subordinate government can assume. This and the general adjustment of imperial and local taxation have created novel and formidable difficulties, but at the same time have simplified the political problem. If Mr. Asquith can evolve a plan satisfactory to all sections of the Liberal party and acceptable to the Nationalists he will achieve a triumph even more remarkable than that attending his victory over hereditary privilege.

The Globe will now refrain from up-braiding the Conservatives with forcing the election, since Sir Wilfrid Laurier has declared that he thought it best to bring the parties before the people.

Hon. G. P. Graham again declares that annexation talk is rubbish. He does not add that the way to dispose of such rubbish is to vote down the cause of it. No reciprocity, no annexation.

One name is conspicuous by its absence from the columns of the reciprocity organs—that of President Taft. He expressed desire to decoy Canada from the imperial band to which the reciprocity bark will split.

## EVERY TEAM DROPS \$100.

Editor World: Mr. Maclean, in his conversation with Charley Burns about horses, could have brought out a still stronger point: not only with reciprocity cut down the value of any horse the Ontario farmer has to sell, but it means also that he will have to write down the value of any team he has by just \$100. ## LAURIER AND BOURASSA.

Editor World: The Liberal mass meeting at St. Hyacinthe, in the Province of Quebec, at which Hon. Mr. Lemieux and Henri Bourassa crossed swords, presents a beautiful picture of the political conditions that exist in that province. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the leader of the French-speaking Canadians who for some time were led by the late Mr. Morier, who was premier of the Liberal government in the Province of Quebec. The movement known as the Nationalist movement was organized by the vote of the French-speaking Canadians for the express purpose of defeating the Liberal-Conservative government. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has 53 followers from the Province of Quebec behind him. They are elected upon a program endorsed and agreed to by Sir Wilfrid. An imperial national sentiment de-

veloped through the whole British Empire, which compelled Sir Wilfrid, as premier of Canada, to act to some extent in harmony with it. So that the Nationalists of Quebec, who were under the political influence of the program of the Quebec Liberal leaders for the past 20 years, cannot yet understand Sir Wilfrid's action in the establishment of a Canadian navy to act in co-operation with the British navy.

It is humiliating to the citizens of a British country to have a government in power, the leader of which is paralyzed by his affiliations with sectional programs, that legislation has to be passed of the same character.

The Liberal-Conservative party in the house of commons and through Canada are on record as British Canadianists. Mr. Borden, as the leader of the party, is not in sympathy with the program of the Nationalists in Quebec because he has declared "I stand for the empire, and Canada first within the empire."

The Nationalists are a Liberal organization; there is a difference among themselves as to the division of the spoils of office, and a family way is on, with Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Henri Bourassa, as commanding officers of the empire, and Canada first within the empire.

The Liberal-Conservative party is not at present concerned about this family conflict, that is going on in the Province of Quebec. The Liberal party is deeply so, because it spells doom for the Laurier government. The Liberal press would like to impress upon the people the fact that the quarrel of Bourassa with Sir Wilfrid is because of his British legislation, whereas it is because Sir Wilfrid has demonstrated himself to the Nationalists as using them for political purposes.
