# HAVE THE GIANT'S POWER

But There's No Indication That Provincial Health Board Will Use It.

The citizens of Toronto have voted down the trunk sewer, but, so says Dr. Sheard, the provincial board of health is in the position, if it so desires, of compelling the building of the sewer, wholly independent of what the sentiment of the people may be. "The city must find the money if the

board orders it to be done," is the statement of the medical health officer, statement of the medical health officer, which makes it appear that the rate-payers merely had a referendum submitted to them on Tuesday last.

Dr. Sheard, who is also a member of the provincial board, doesn't go so far as to say that such a drastic move will be made, while Hon. W. J. Hanna, provincial secretary, to whom Dr. Hodgetts, secretary of the board of health, referred the newspaper men, stated that the statement of Dr. Sheard was absolutely without reference to anything that was ever said in the department, or by anyone in it. The government, he said, were not engaged in any attempt to coerce the city.

tempt to coerce the city. So, whatever powers may have been conferred in an amendment to the Public Health Act, it may well be that the board of health, of which Dr. Sheard is chairman, will hesitate about applying them. It is known that the clause in the set to which Dr. Sheard clause in the act, to which Dr. Sheard now refers, has been considered by the board, but; so far as can be ascertained, not directly in the light of a means of forcing upon the city an undertaking that it has since rejected.

The Clause.

The clause states that no sewage of any kind, tending to make impure the water supply for domestic use, of any city, town, incorporated village or other municipality shall be emptied in the water, or placed near the source of water supply for domestic use, "nor within such distance thereof as may be considered unsafe by the provincial beard of health of the area or examination." board of health after an examination thereof by a member or officer of the said board; and any person who shall offend against any provision of this offend against any provision of this section shall upon summary conviction-be liable to a penalty of not more than \$100 for each offence and each week's tontinuance after notice by the provin-cial board of health or local board of health to abate or remove the same, shall constitute a separate offence."

It will be seen that no course is prescribed, other than the general one of removing a nuisance.
