There were also reports here, from reliable sources too, to the effect that the crop conditions were showing good improvement. These, however, got lost in the shuffle, as it evidently suited the books of the crowd to ignore them. The weather in the Northwest is all right now for seeding, and according to the best accounts it is rapidly nearing completion. The area sown will exceed that of last year. Foreign markets seem singularly indifferent to the advancing tendency here. Our streigth does not make the slightest impression on them. They evidently do not comprehend that their supplies are low and that they must come to us shortly to augment their stocks. They are too patient as buyers to suit our excitable dispositions. New York reported only 60,000 bushels taken for export today, Minneapolis and Duluth stocks are estimated to show from 25,000 to 50,000 increase. The visible supply is expected to increase about 750,000 bushels.

Provisions—Higher prices for hogs gave the market a firm opening. Packers generally were buyers. Shorts bought pork very freely, led by Cudahy brokers, alvancing prices 20c. At the advance there was liberal realizing by local longs in pork and selling of ribs by packers closed the market steadler.
