At Toledo clover seed closed at \$4.80 for April and \$4.70 for October.

Car receipts at Chicago to-day 2500; market steady to firm.

Receipts of grain at Chicago to-day: Wheat 15,000; corn 10,000; rye 7,000; left over 5,000. Estimated for Saturday 12,000.

Market active with prices averaging 6c higher. Heavy shipments \$3.30 to \$3.50.

Receipts of wheat at Liverpool: 100,000 bushels, as against 100,000 bushels, no American. Receipts of American corn 111,000.
