Mr. 6. A. Howland ou Cuba.

Before Lodge Commercial, S.O.E.B.S., Mr. O. A. Howland lectured on Saturday night on Cuba. The paper was a very exhaustive one, but treating, as it did, of almost every phase the question presents, it proved most interesting. The lecturer considered that if the President's original message was taken as a casus belli in Spain, the United States would be exonerated. He treated of the attitude of Grover Cleveland on the Venezuelan Commission as opposed to the forced stand of McKinley in delivering the ultimatum, of the great import to Canada of the conflict, which he considered, after a victorious navai battle had been bought, and the States gaining a footing in the Philippines, would best end for the Yankees by their relinquishing any claim on Cuba.

"McKinley," said he, "should have made the Maine question the most important element at the outset, and forced Spain to answer as to whether through Congress an enquiry should be made by her in America. If her answer was negative the United States would be exonerated." Mr. O. A. Howland on Cuba.
