TRIP TO GOTHAM DECLARED OFF BECAUSE OF RECENT STREET TALK

Alderman Morden Denies That the Passes Had Anything to Do With His Motion to Close Cement Contract—Prizes for Well-Kept Lawns.

Hamilton, Oct. 29.—A meeting of the Board of Works was held tonight at the City Hall, but some of the members, who are apparently disgusted with the turn of affairs, didn't attend. Those present could not fix on a date to enjoy the hospitality of the Lehigh Cement Co. and the trip to Gotham was indefinitely postponed. It is not likely that the members will see the "great cement works on the Lehigh Valley R.R. or the red right district of Gotham" this fall.

That Gotham Trip.—The exposure of the peculiarities in connection with the Board of Works' trip to New York and the cement contract for next year caused a good deal of talk on the streets to-day. So many adverse remarks were made that the aldermen concerned in the proposed excursion were not anxious to go to Gotham. Ald. Morden maintained to-day that he acted in good faith in the matter. He admitted that the passes for the seven members of his committee were obtained thru the instructions of the cement company, but denies that that fact had anything to do with his motion to suspend the cement contract. He says that the cement man to whom Ald. Walker referred last night as being prepared to supply the city next year at a price lower than is now being paid, is C. P. Rutty of Buffalo. Mr. Rutty has been connected with the cement business a long time, and Ald. Walker has faith in him. On the other hand, it is said the company that he represented when the cement contract was called for suspended operations before the season was half over. The city saved \$12,800 this year on the cement, as compared with last year.

For Beautifying the City.—Next week the City Improvement Society will announce the names of the prize winners in the competition in progress all summer in beautifying the city. The cultivation of lawns and flowers, it is probable that the cash prizes will be distributed at a public dinner in a few previous years there has been little or no attempt at beautifying lawns and house fronts. REAL ESTATE INTELLIGENCE

List of City and County Property Transfers and Building Permits Issued—Feeling in Reference to Local Real Estate Market Fairly Good—Increased Assessments.

Since the latter end of last week no sales of exceptional consequence have been reported in the local real estate field. However, there have been recorded a large number of sales of what might be termed minor importance. The general feeling in the market is a fairly good one. "While the business is recovering in a remarkable way from the depression of the past few years, it is not so satisfactory as would otherwise be the case were matters seriously considered and properly handled by those in authority." This is evidently the idea entertained by many of the leading real estate agents in Toronto, and expressed by not a few of them to The World's real estate representative yesterday.

During the hearing of last Saturday and Monday's evidence Judge McDougall, in reference to the Yonge-street appeals against the increased assessment, a number of Toronto's real estate men could have been noticed amongst those present.
