MINERS GET INCREASE

Halifax, N.S., May 18.—The threatened strike of the miners in Cape Breton has been declared off. The companies have granted a ten per cent. increase demanded by the men.

RECOVERED THE OPERA GLASSES

George F. Ends of the rear of 144 Wilton-street is under arrest. No violation charged by Henry Crouch with stealing two pairs of opera glasses. LABOR MOTION FOR LEGISLATION ON PICKETING DEFEATED BY SMALL MAJORITY.

LONDON, May 18.—The debate and division in the House of Commons on Wednesday night last are interesting and as important to employers of labor as to trades unionists throughout the world.

The motion, which had been drawn up in consultation by the leading representatives of trades unionism, declared that legislation was necessary to protect the rights of workmen from the effects of recent judgments in the House of Lords.

The amendment, which was substantially a direct negative, was supported by the Home Secretary and the Attorney-General, but was only carried by a majority of 29.

The trades unions are powerful bodies. They have a good deal of influence upon members of parliament, even in this Conservative House.

The case for the picketing is a strong one. They take their stand upon the act of 1875, passed by a Conservative government to amend the Libel act of 1871.

From 1875 to 1902 it was understood to be accepted by lawyers and judges and by the industrial community that picketing was legal if there was no intimidation.

Not till 1901 was it decided that a trades union could be sued for acts of its subordinate officers.

The state of the law is very obscure and the Attorney-General did little to clear it up and lay down the law.

Picketing, as Sir Robert Reid pointed out, may no longer be the form of persuading workmen but must be restricted to collecting information.

The power in the hands of trades unions may have been abused, especially when it aims at restricting production, but the best beneficial influence in controlling unreasonable workmen, their best employers, whatever their politics, is taken away by a trade union.

These men are unanimous in thinking the interference of parliament is required to clear up and lay down the law.

An age of gigantic combinations and strikes is scarcely the appropriate time for limiting and impairing the liberty of the working classes to act together in self-defence.

Over Seven Hundred Members of the Order March to St. Philip's Church.

CANON SWEENEY PREACHED TO THEM

Dwelt on the Glory of the Motherland—Growth and Work of the Order.

To the strains of martial music 700 Englishmen walked to St. Philip's Church, corner of Spadina-avenue and St. Patrick-street, yesterday afternoon.

It was the annual church service of the Sons of England Benevolent Society, 477, was participated by the St. George's Society and the Daughters and Maids of England.

The procession was formed on Jarvis-street above Carlton-street. It moved off headed by the band of the 48th Highlanders under the leadership of John Slater, North York.
