40,000 SOLDIER AND 3,000 TARP VOTES EXPECTED THROUGH CANADA

Polls Will Be Held in Every Place Where a Unit Can Be Found.

ORGANIZED BY DISTRICTS

Presiding Officer for Each Centre Will Appoint His Deputies.

WILL BE 3 NAVAL BASES

Sailors May Also Vote While on Sea—Deputies Will Enjoy Cruise.

OTTAWA, Nov. 1.—Forty thousand military votes and 3,000 naval votes, it is expected, will be cast in Canada in the coming election. So far as is possible, polls will be held in every camp, base, barracks, rest station, ship, dockyard, hospital, or any other place where a military or naval unit may be found. Exactly how the Dominion will be organized territorially for the election is not yet determined, but the general scheme will probably be along these lines:

For the military votes, a presiding officer will be named in each military district. The presiding officer will in turn appoint deputy presiding officers, who will actually take the soldiers' ballots in camp, hospital or wherever a unit is stationed.

Three Naval Bases. For the naval vote there will probably be three bases, Halifax, Esquimaux and Sydney or St. John, as may be found more convenient. At each of the bases there will be a presiding officer, who, acting in the capacity of a returning officer, will have general jurisdiction in his district and appoint deputy returning officers to take the vote. The military and naval vote will be held within the limits of Canadian territory will all be polled on the ordinary polling day, Monday, December 17.

But arrangements have also to be made for taking the vote of Canadians on the high seas. A naval vote cast outside the territorial limits of Canada, like the vote of a soldier overseas, will be polled from the day after nomination day to election day itself—a period of 25 days. To meet this case, it is proposed that where a naval vessel is due to leave the Canadian base, and is not likely to return before election day, she shall take on board a deputy presiding officer, who will carry ballot papers with him. The presiding officer will then cast his vote at sea, and the deputy presiding officer will return to the base as quickly as possible with the votes.

It is not necessary, under the terms of the military voters' act, that a military or naval vote shall be cast at any one particular polling station. The soldier or sailor may vote at any military or naval polling station he can reach. Military and naval voting in Canada will be during the voting hours of the same day as the civil polls are held. All polls held within the cities of Ottawa, Montreal, Toronto, Quebec, Regina, St. John, Toronto, Vancouver, Victoria, Winnipeg, St. Paul, St. Thomas, Moose Jaw, Kingston, Brockville, Ont., Saskatoon, Charlottetown, Sherbrooke, Windsor, Chatham, Lethbridge, Medicine Hat, Sydney, Glace Bay and St. John's will open at 6 o'clock in the morning and close at 6 o'clock in the afternoon. All other polls will open at 6 o'clock in the morning and close at 6 o'clock in the afternoon.

VON HERTLING IS CHANCELLOR; ALSO PRUSSIA'S PREMIER

Vice-Chancellor and Food Minister Are Out.

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 1.—According to dispatches received here from Berlin the Cologne Gazette says Emperor William received Count von Hertling this afternoon and that von Hertling accepted the imperial chancellorship and the office of premier of Prussia.

Dr. Karl Helfferich, secretary of the interior and vice-chancellor, and Herr von Walder, president of the German food republic board, have resigned. Friedrich von Payer, governor of Reichstag, says the dispatch, is to be appointed vice-chancellor, and Herr Friedberg, leader of the National Liberal party, will be given the post of president of the Prussian ministry.

The Cologne Gazette says the resignation of Vice-Admiral von Capelle as minister of the navy, has not been accepted.

SEDITIONS CONVICT ACTS WILDLY AFTER RELEASE

Man Sentenced From Toronto Flourishes Firearms.

KINGSTON, Nov. 1.—Complaint was made to George Hunter, J.P., today that Alexander Auer recently given two years in Toronto, for seditious remarks and who was released after serving a week because the conviction was quashed on the ground that the case should have been first handled by the military authorities, was in the northern part of Frontenac County, flourishing firearms. Government Urged to Impose Price on Britain.

BROCKVILLE, Nov. 1.—A resolution was passed by the cheese board today urging the Dominion Government and the Imperial cheese commission to take prompt action influencing the British Government to set as an advance the price of Canadian cheese at least 4 cents a pound. It was claimed that the present low production at a larger output the present fixed price unprofitable and unsatisfactory to the farmers supplying milk to cheese factories. Objection was taken to the resolution by two buyers, who argued that the difficulty of financing the cheese market was responsible, not the British Government, for the seemingly low price of cheese. Sales were made today at 11 1/4c.

IN CLINTON 55 YEARS. CLINTON, Nov. 1.—After a continuous residence in Clinton of 55 years Mrs. Holloway, wife of the late Thomas Holloway, died today in her 84th year.

BABY-KILLERS FAIL IN MOST ELABORATE MISSION OF "HATE"

Wednesday's Raid Was "Lay London in Ruins."

DEFENSES THWART FOE

Seven Groups in Squadron—Few Reach Metropolitan.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—The air raid last night apparently was the most elaborate attempt at "lay London in ruins" ever made by the Germans. That it was a failure was due to the new air defenses, which with the gunfire of the airplanes harassed the enemy and broke up his squadrons so that at most three machines were able to cross the metropolis, where they dropped a few bombs.

According to the official report the raiders came in seven groups of three or four machines each while other aircraft individually attacked other localities. Before the guns broke out over London the raiders were heard a long way off and in the east. The people congratulated themselves that the raiders were kept at bay, but soon sounds were heard which told the tale of airplanes having broken through. During some periods the firing seemed the most intense that had been experienced during air raids. The atmospheric conditions prevented anything being seen of the invaders. There was a watery moon and misty clouds, but the sound of the engines of the raiders plainly could be heard. There were several intervals of dead silence in the firing, periods during which it was felt that the raid had come to an end, but it only meant that one relay had been driven off, and real relief did not come until Boy Scouts sounded "all clear" on their bugles.

LAST GREAT BATTLE MAY BE FOUGHT OUT IN PLAINS OF FRIULI

Washington Receives Reassuring News From Rome.

Washington, Nov. 1.—Reassuring news came from Rome today in official dispatches. While serious, the situation on the Italian front is described as far from desperate. Gen. Cadorna's army is declared to be practically intact, and complete confidence is expressed in his ability, with aid coming from the Allies, to stop the Austro-German drive. Cablegrams summarize the situation as follows: "The military situation on the Italian front is serious—it is far from being desperate. At the present moment, having recovered from the first surprise, it may be stated that our Allies are preparing to oppose a furious resistance to the enemy at the point which, without doubt, Gen. Cadorna has selected. It is probable that if the retreat should continue for a few days longer, the Italian resistance will develop along the Tagliamento, quite an important river, which descends from the Cernia Alps; or, perhaps, the Austro-German drive will be stopped on the Piave River, which flows westward.

Army is Not Weakened. "Whatever the number of Italians taken prisoners, the strength of the army of General Cadorna has not been weakened. It must not be forgotten in fact, that Italy has under the colors more than three million men. As for the guns that the Austro-Germans claim to have captured, they only represent the production of a few weeks of the munitions factories of our allies. "The Italian army is practically intact. Besides, the French and British are coming to our rescue. It has already been announced at the beginning of the council Sunday evening that the French ministers were busy determining the extent and nature of the co-operation of the Allies on the Italian front.

May Meet on Freoule Plain. "This same question was further considered by the council Monday morning and by the war committee, which was held at the Elysee. M. Poincaré, president. The British Government has taken prompt measures to rush aid to the Italians, and all indications are that this French and British aid will come at the hour when the enemy invades the plains of Freoule.

"Meanwhile, awaiting developments, Italian public opinion realizes thoroughly the gravity of the hour, and is bearing the shock with calmness and firmness. "The Italian press declares that the battle which is about to take place, will be the last great battle of the war."

RUSSIANS SINK CRAFT OF FOE IN BLACK SEA

PETROGRAD, Nov. 1.—In an attack on Turkish vessels in Ada Bay, on the Black Sea, near the Bosphorus, Russian torpedo boats sank a Turkish motorboat and destroyed two Turkish destroyers.

Another withdrawal of German troops on the Northern Russian front is in progress. "On the northern front, in the direction of Riga, the enemy at some points is withdrawing to positions previously prepared."

"The retreat is taking place with the enemy rear guard in continual contact with our reconnoitering detachments, and there are no possible grounds for supposing that this retreat will permit the possibility of his throwing his troops on to any other front."

"The situation on the other fronts in the Baltic is unchanged." "Black Sea—Two of our torpedo boats, dispatched to destroy a Turkish steamer damaged by one of our submarines, discovered an enemy torpedo boat and two steamers in Inada Bay. The enemy torpedo boat was sunk, the two steamers burned, and a naval battery in the bay destroyed."
