Teamsters employed by the London and Port Stanley Railway joined the union teamsters' strike this morning. As a result of this action all cartage of freight to and from the railroads of the city by the companies under contract to move the freight has ceased, and freight is piling up both in the warehouses and freight sheds of the city.

The teamsters on the L, and P. S. R., although belonging to the union, did not go on strike when the employees of the Dominion Cartage Company, the SI & den Forwarding Company, and the O'Dell Cartage left work, because a compromise was reached with the company. The union made a demand of a minimum wage of \$100 a month, but an offer of the L. and P. S. R. of \$90 a month was accepted. an offer of the L. and P. S. R. of \$90 a month was accepted.
It is claimed by the officials of the union that at the time the agreement was made the officials of the road had made a promise that they would not expect the men to pick up freight, that rightly belonged to the other cartage companies. It was reported that the L. and P. S. R. had broken the agreement and for that reason the teamsters were called out.

Negotiations have not been opened up with the other companies as yet, and up to the present time no teams have left the companies' stables, according to the committee in charge of the strike.

"The truckers in the employ of the railroads expressed their sympathy for the strikers." railroads expressed their sympathy for the strikers at a meeting held last night." said H. Wray, the labor organizer. They are waiting instructions from the headquarters of their union before they take any steps. All particulars of the strike have been sent to the minister of labor, and it is expected according to the officials of the union, that he will wire a reply today. Freight is being piled up in the different freight sheds in the city, and the many firms of the city are beginning to feel the results of the tie-up. The transfer and cartage companies are working hard to serve the smaller concerns, while the large firms of the city make use of their own delivery trucks. The express companies are working overtime to handle the heavy demand put upon them.
