DENIES RIGHT TAKEN BY GEDDES TO SPEAK FOR IRISH PEOPLE

H. J. Boland Says Question Not Domestic, But International.

Is Boland, a member of the parliament of the "Provisional Irish Republic," issued a statement here today on the Irish question in reply to views expressed yesterday at New York by Sir Auckland Geddes, the new British ambassador to Geddes, the new British ambassador t the United States.

"Sir Auckland Geddes," Mr. Boland said, "expressed the view that the British Government wants now 'to place fairly and squarely on the shoulders of British Empire the solution of their po-litical differences.

"Ireland refuses to take any position

within the framework of the British Empire. She feels as the American col-onist felt that the right of a people to liberty is a self-evident truth. "Sir Auckland Geddes, in suggesting that all other peoples stand aside that all other peoples stand aside in this controversy, assumes the right to speak for Ireland as well as Great Britain. The Irish people have repudiated Britain. The only people in a position to speak for Ireland in America are those officially designated by the Irish parliament. The British ambassador assumes to present the Irish question to the American people as a domestic matter of Great Britain. The Irish question is an international question; therefore it is an American question.
