WILL GET GAS AT OLD RATES, DECLARES MAYOR OF WINDSOR

Severe Arraignment of Union Natural Gas Company's Tactics.

\$1,500,000 EXTRA A YEAR

Would Result From 75 Cents Per 1,000 Cubic Feet

WINDSOR, Aug. 26,- "Windsor will ontinue to get gas and they will get at the same price as now," Mayor Winter told members of the Border Chamber of Commerce today during a hot arraignment of the Union Gas Company and its attempt to increase its prices here from 30 cents to \$1 housand cubic feet.

No Reason for Increase. "The Windsor Gas Company has ontract with the Union Gas Company of Chatham to supply gas as long as there is gas to be had. and I haven't heard anyone saying there is no gas. I believe the contract is a good instrument and believe we are going to have gas at the same rate. I don't believe there is any reason for an increase and don't think there is going to be any.

o be any.

Made a Mistake.

"When I asked the company with they wanted \$1 in Windsor and other places a rate of 50 lowed other places a rate of 50 and 75 cents, they said they wanted to con-serve the supply here for cooking and heating, but when I pointed out that

serve the supply here for cooking and heating, but when I pointed out that these restrictions were not in effect elsewhere, they admitted making a mistake in asking for \$1 here.

Company Not Fair.

"The only statement of Mr. Little of London, who is a director of the company, with which I agree is that the company has not been fair, they have not laid their cards on the table. Only when the company admits that its stock is watered and squeezes out the water will the people consider giving them what is reasonably coming to them.

Would Only Spend Tenth.


